He said, "We talked about putting a clothesline type deal and hanging goodie bags with clothespins, keeping them 6 feet apart for social distancing so kids can come up and pull one off." This would keep the 6-feet apart regulation going, and would also limit the amount of physical contact in between trick-or-treaters. Lilly also

went on to say that "kids have missed out on enough," and that in his opinion, "Halloween is sort of the biggest holiday for kids. No holiday has surpassed Halloween."

Another popular place trick or treaters love to get candy is at trunk or treats. Tennessee Avenue Baptist Church in Bristol, TN is hosting a "trunks of treats" on October 31st from 4-6 pm. The Children's Ministry Director, Tiffany Sweeney, also has precautions that they will take to ensure the safety of everyone at this annual event.

Sweeney says, "there will be security to maintain traffic flow, there will be volunteers with gloves handing out candy. We ask that children do not reach into the buckets to get candy. There will also be sanitation stations and this year we will not provide food. However, there will be 5 food trucks so anyone who wants to purchase food can. There will also be signs promoting social distancing and only a couple of families at a time going through the trunks."

Although this year's Halloween won't be the same, we can still make the most out of it. Whether you are trunk or treating, knocking on doors, or both, remember to bring your mask and social distance. Happy Halloween!!

As someone who has been playing Among Us for a while now--including a collective 12 hours and 32 minutes just this week--I've learned a thing or two about being and sussing an imposter. Some of these tips are for 2 or 3 imposters, as I usually play 3 for a higher chance of being an imposter. Granted, these don't work every time, but they're helpful to know, so buckle up! PART I: SUSSING AN IMPOSTER

Following Starting with the obvious-- I promise they get better: following. When someone is following you, it seems they're waiting on the kill cooldown to end or possibly have the same tasks, rarely. 
