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## Senior Class History

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It was with fear and trembling that we, the class of '22, entered old Tennessee High School, in the fall of 1918. We had long longed for the time when we should be allowed to take up our abode at B. T. H. S., to share its victories and defeats, and probably have some part in the hard fought battles that uphold the honor and pride of every student at Tennessee High School. We could hardly realize we had reached our long dreamed of goal.

With wonderful plans as to how we would revolutionize things, we plunged into our new life. But strangely, the rest of the school didn't seem to feel us as necessary as we had thought we would be. We had no voice whatever in the big affairs of the school, and strangely not one of us starred that first term in the great athletic combats. But our talent along other lines was too marked to go unnoticed. For instance, the class was exceedingly fortunate in having one of its members, Charlie Hagan, who from his famous process of deduction, by which Sherlock Holmes has profited much, applied to the hypothesis obtained from the very obliging teachers, secured many helpful hints, which were of almost indispensable value to the members of the class. During this first year we lost one of our best students, Martha Butler, but she had no sayso in the matter, as her family moved out of Bristol.

Regardless of this great loss we managed to skin thru into the congregation of the Sophs. During this year we had no real business to execute except making additions and subtraction to our class. The Autumn of 1920 rolled around. Then came the day we had been longing to see, and had striven so hard to attain; we were Juniors! It was then that we began to awake as it were from a dormant state and to emerge into the sunlight of importance. We behold the pathway laid out before us which we needs must tread. We had business to do and things to look after. So, realizing what was expected of us, we settled down to real work, and though I must be very modest, we overcame them with complete success. Of course, things might have been different had we not had another brainy person besides those previously mentioned, at the helm steering the class thru the troubled seas. Louis Bachman was our president. We were not all idiots, nor were we by any means philosophers, but we had quite a bit of talent in our class. For instance, with the aid of Ike Moore, as general stage manager, and Clarence Whiteaker as electrical genius, we had in 1921, two great successes on the stage, the best minstrel show Tennessee has ever given, and our Junior play. True, the Seniors of last year carried off the honors for the minstrel, but it was really the talent of the Junior Class which made the hit of the evening. These modest gentlemen have requested that I forbear to mention their names, but I am sure everyone will remember who they were. We have always been proud that we have “Nothing

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But The Truth" to our credit. The leading parts played by Ruth Love Swadley and Felix Hagan were done so affectingly and affectionately that they themselves actually lived the parts. They were seen several times later playing their roles without an audience but with a spectator. It was thru the financial success of this play that we were enabled to entertain the Seniors so well at Island Park, the last day of their stay with us.

The anaesthetic of Junior exams put us to sleep. It was not until the three summer months had passed that we awoke to realize with a startling sensation that we were Seniors.

This has been a year crammed with labor, care, and one event right after another. At the very beginning we started off with a bang, and established a record in football that will be hard to beat and which surpasses all previous records of Tennessee High. In basket-ball we did not accomplish such superlative results, but our record is not one to be ashamed of. Tho Virginia kept the Cowan cup, our quintet took one of the three games and came so near winning a second that Virginia hasn't gotten over her scare yet. We took four out of the six halves and lost the cup only by three points. During this period we went to Kingsport High for a little basket-ball practice.
