We, the members of the Senior Class of the Tennessee High School, in the City of Bristol, State of Tennessee, on this thirteenth day of May in the year of Our Lord, Nineteen Hundred and Twenty-seven, being of sound body and a light frame of mind, do hereby publish and declare this to be our last will and testament, hereby annulling all former wills made by us.

After many weeks of work and worry our hopes again beat high. Every class and every organization had united in a campaign for our Annual. With renewed courage we set to work to earn our share. Seniors were to be seen working all around, selling candy, having rummage sales and engaged in various other ways of money-making. Then, at last, the precious Memory Book of our high school days went to press!

And now our pilgrimage is over, only to begin anew at the brink of life. We stand upon the high "Cliff of Hope," the bright light shining all about us. We only desire that in the future our work in life may be as happy, as successful as our work in Tennessee High and that the influence and good will of our teachers may continue to inspire and influence others as it has us. And now as a word of farewell, may I say:

My best of wishes go to you—
God keep and bless you, always!"
