Yes, Phil, we're really proud of Tennessee High School. The intellectual education is rounded by both social and physical development. After our regular morning devotionals, we go to French



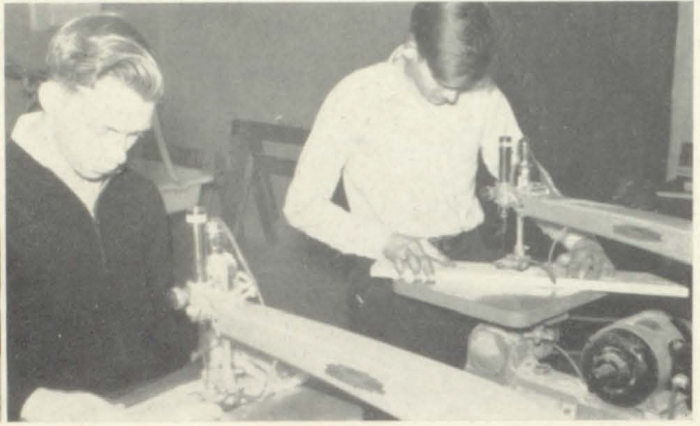
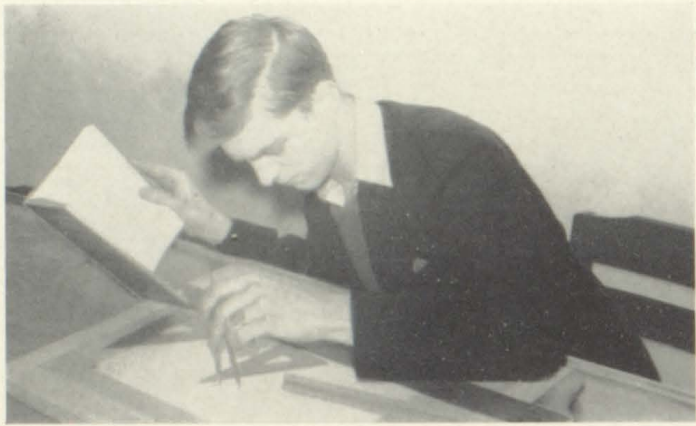
class, and from there to Mathematics where we get an outview as well as an insight of the subject.



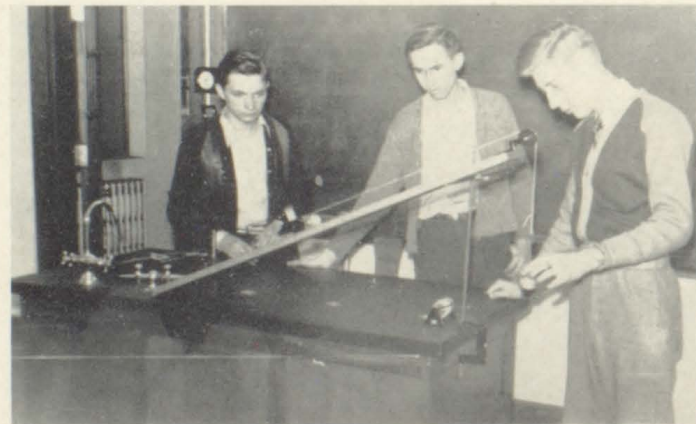
In English class we study literature, grammar, and news, and make field trips to the printing plant and are allowed to operate the machines ourselves.

Though shop is open to girls, it is generally studied by boys. Mechanical drawing aids in future work, and is a very popular course.



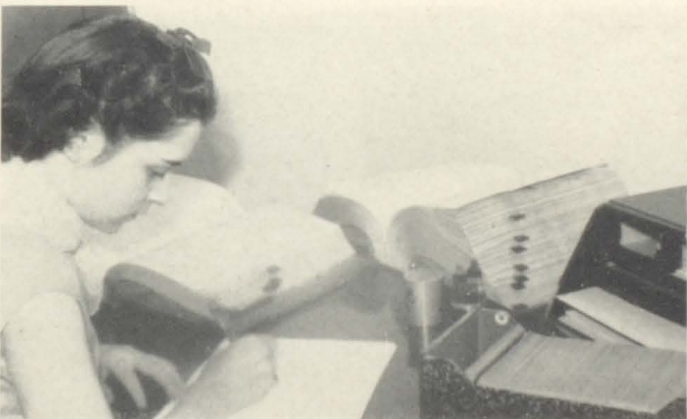
In our field of science, we have chemistry for the adventuresome students and physics for the scientific ones who want to know what makes things "gee".



We are fortunate in having a fast-growing music department. The band members are given individual attention, and the band has cer-



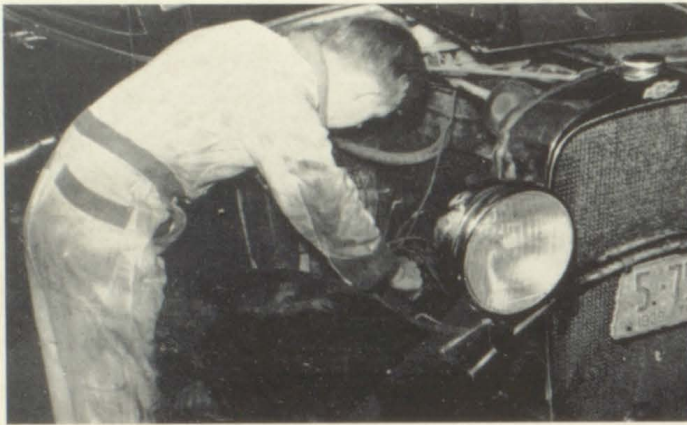
tainly added zest to the pep meetings. The glee club is progressing rapidly and has given one concert and aided in the annual oper-

Dec. 12—In the return engagement with the fast Sullivan five, the Vikings suffered their first setback of the year as the County boys won handily, 22 to 34.

Dec. 15—The inability of the Tennessee players to shift effectively resulted in their first Conference loss as the screen style of basket-ball used by Johnson City brought the Hilltoppers out on the top end of a 22 to 34 score.

Jan. 5—Journeying to Erwin to meet the Blue Devils in their own back-yard, the Maroon and White team was trounced, 34 to 43, despite the brilliant offensive work of Al Peoples.

Jan. 6—The Vikings returned to the victory column by virtue of a 33 to 24 win over the Morristown Hurricane. The work of Peoples and Worley featured the hard-fought game.

Jan. 13—The boys played the highly-rated Knoxville City High on even terms for three quarters but the deadly eye of their opponent's All-State center, Bill Wright, led a closing rally and the visiting Trojans edged out a 31 to 36 game.

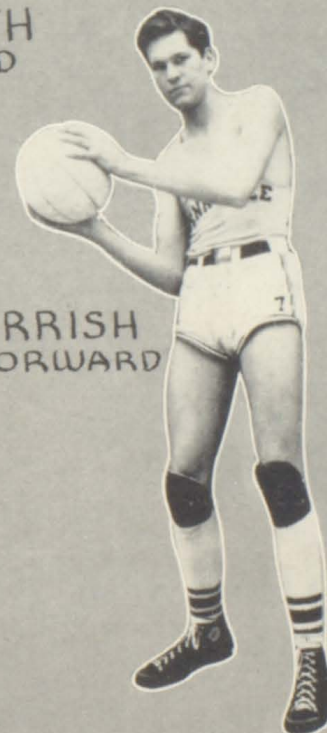

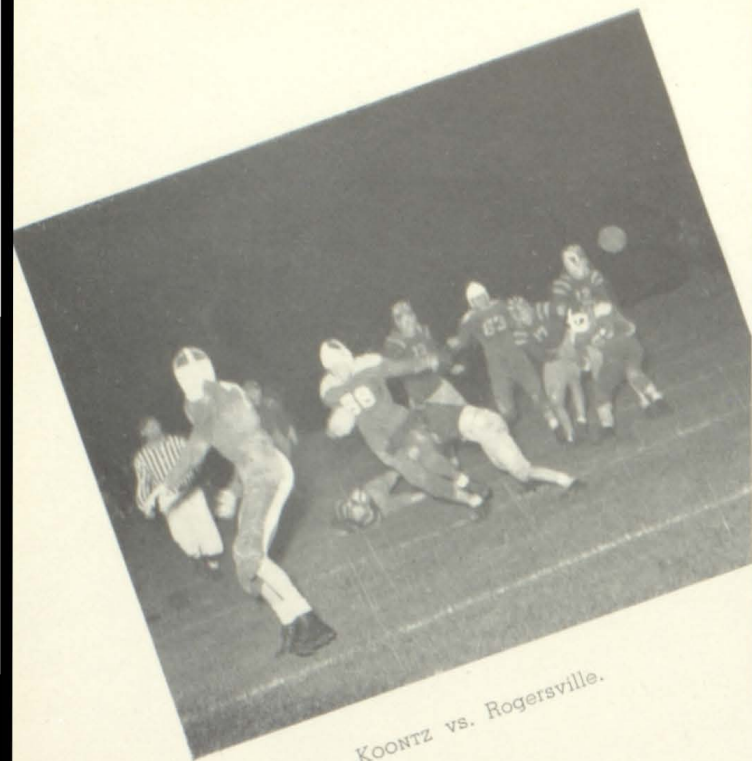

The victory was indeed a costly one for the Vikings, as Cary Gray, heady field general, suffered a dislocated elbow that continually hampered his efforts during the remainder of the season.

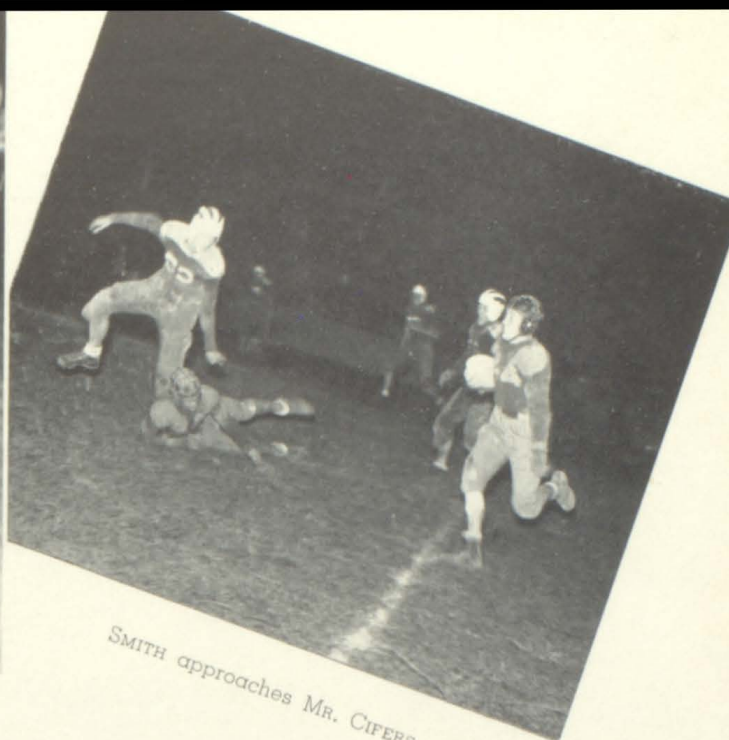

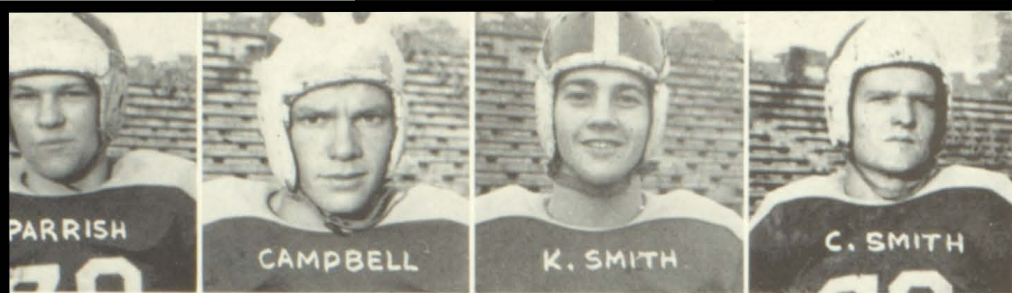

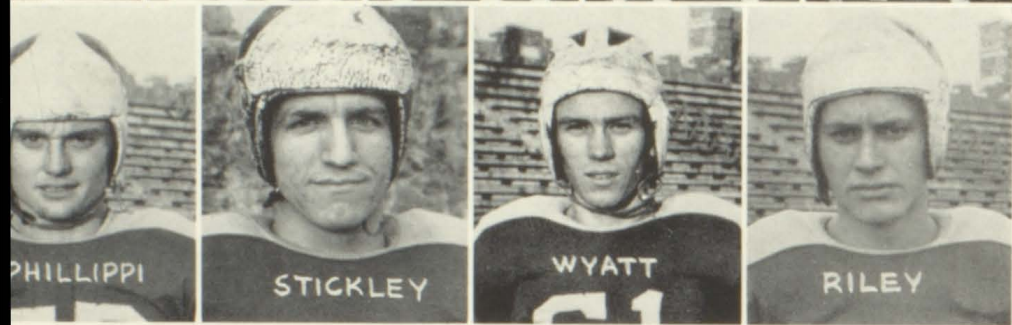

W. K. Lambert . . . is plenty big and should play lots of football in the future.

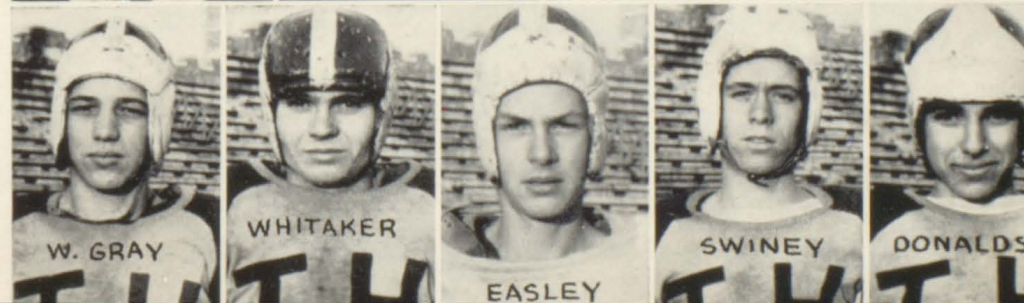

March 26—Louise Bush got the lead in the Senior play, and by all indications it will be a good one.

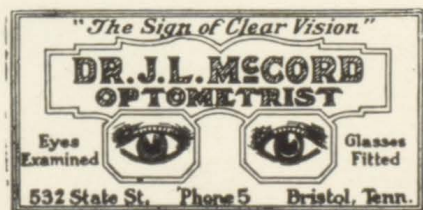
