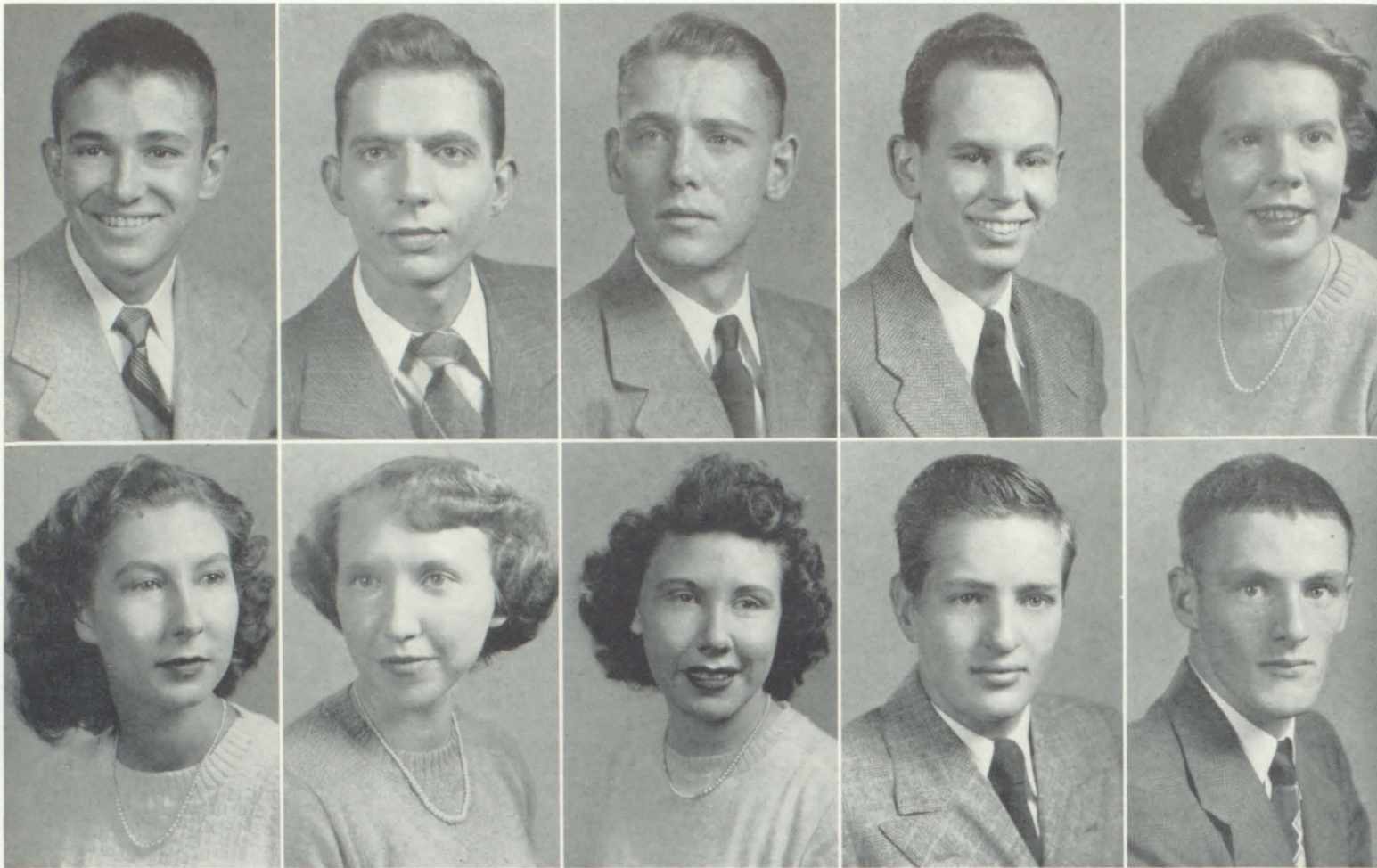
SENIOR PLAY

All girls attending Tennessee High participate regularly in health and physical education classes. A varied program of activities is carried on to meet the needs of all the girls.

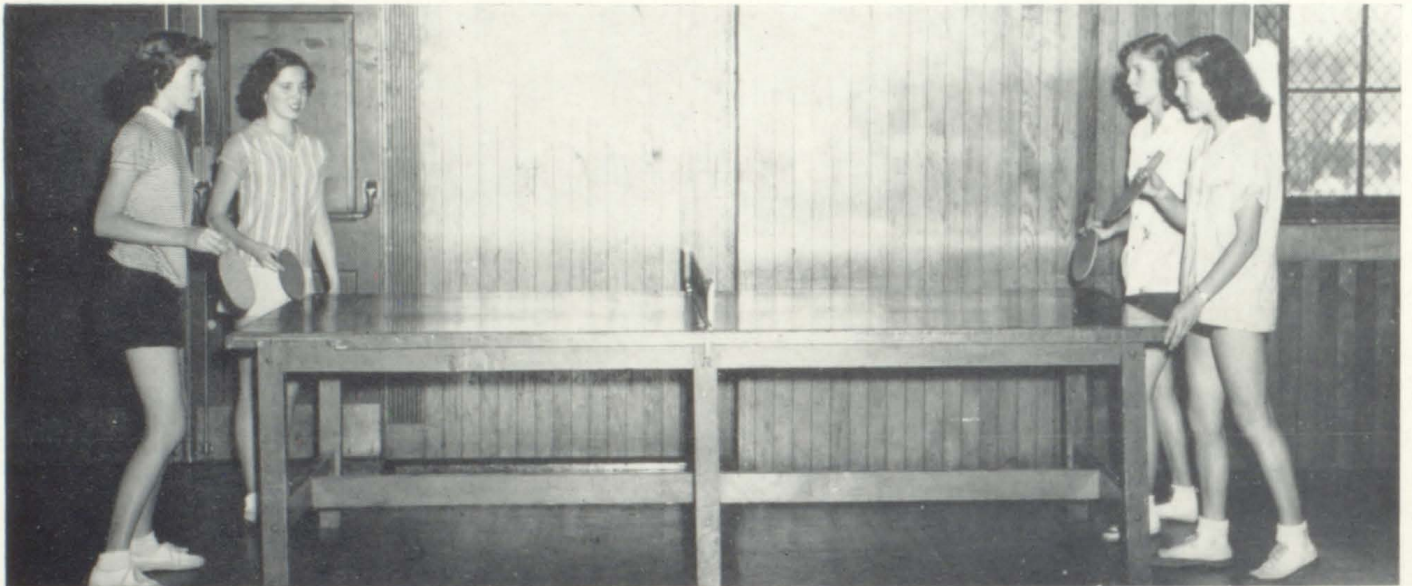
An intramural program is carried out for the girls and a point system is in the making whereby the girls may earn letters. This program includes tournaments in the major and minor sports and hikes.
