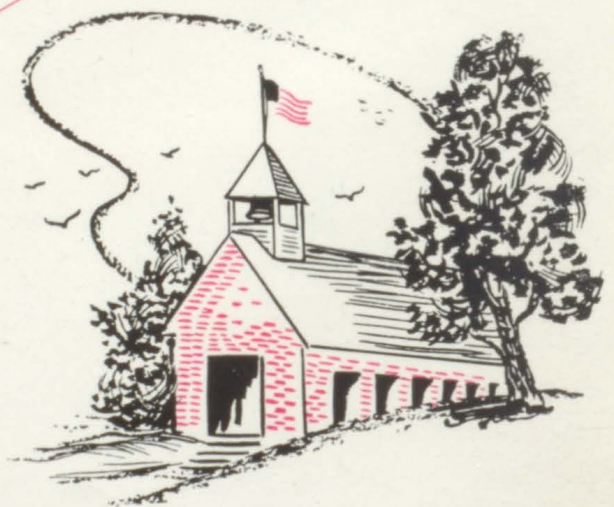
SCHOOL DAYS

For us vacation passed quickly; and after an enjoyable summer we returned to school. The name, Bristol Tennessee High School, had





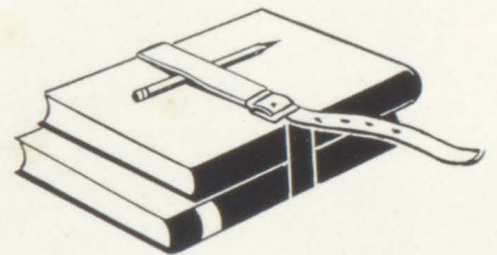

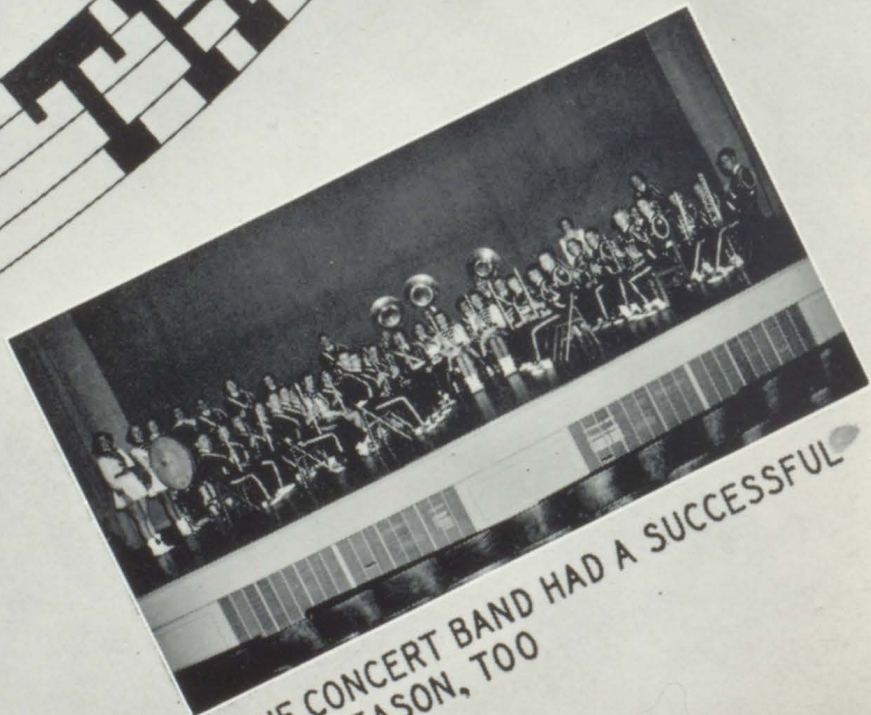

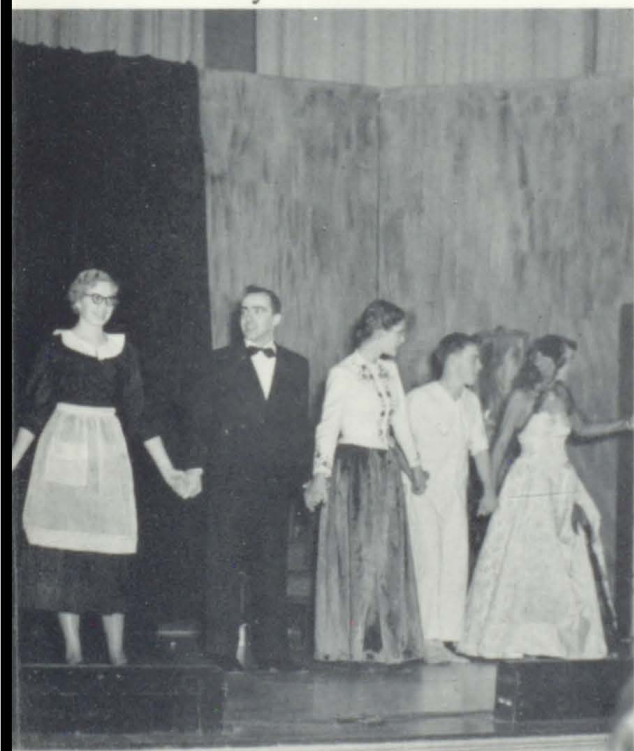
