In the fall of 1948, we, the class of '51, entered Tennessee High School as Sophomores. Having had one year of high school courses at Junior High, we were sure of our ability to make the grade at T.H.S.

At Tennessee High School we found a different system from the one we had been accustomed to at Junior High. This "newness" was offset by the patience and understanding of our instructors, and by our readiness to learn. Well-known to everyone, this class has had and still has plenty of "Yankee ingenuity," coupled with that Southern ability to "do anything, possible or impossible."

The fall of 1950 found us Seniors, but many of the boys who enrolled with us in September are not here with us now. The memory of these has been with us throughout the school year and our thoughts are with them now.

Some of the boys felt that by enlisting they would be of immediate and useful service to our country. Others saw an advantage in first obtaining an education before going to war, and stayed to finish school. Either way, in training or in fighting, this class is serving the country as it best knows how.

The Senior year at Tennessee High is a wonderful experience and we have made the most of it. There have been many outstanding high-

lights of our Senior year, such as the excellent sports records made, the plays, the parties, dances, and outings, and the year has passed all too fast.

The school work seemed especially hard at the beginning of the year, but we soon began to get accustomed to it, and have done a lot of good work. We now see why Tennessee High has always rated so high scholastically.

As we look back upon the three years at Tennessee High and view it as a whole, we feel the deep sense of pride that comes with a "job well done."

Now as we go out from our great Alma Mater, where we have learned so much, and which we have now come to love so dearly, we do not forget to offer a prayer to God for peace, that no longer may boys feel it necessary to leave the halls of learning to fight against the other peoples of the world.

Though we, the graduating class of 1951, entered a world of turmoil, we overcame our difficulties, because "Character is destiny" and our lives shaped themselves by this truth.

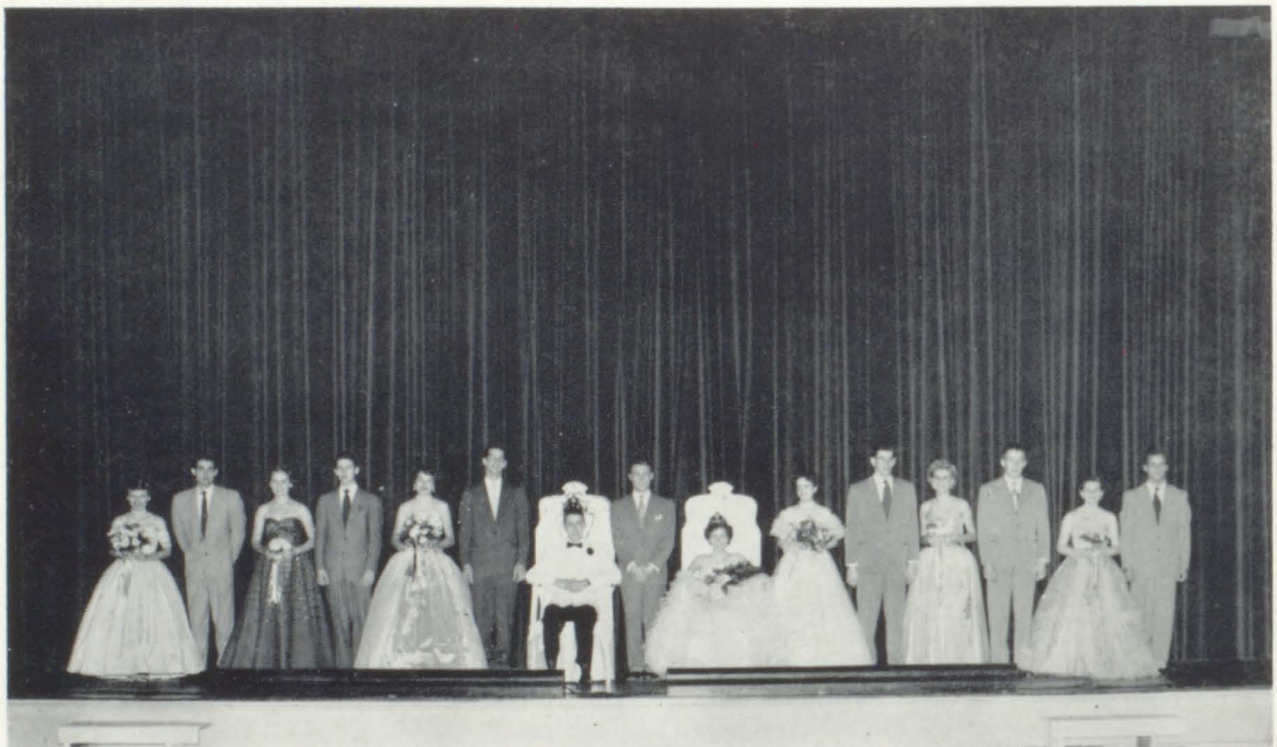

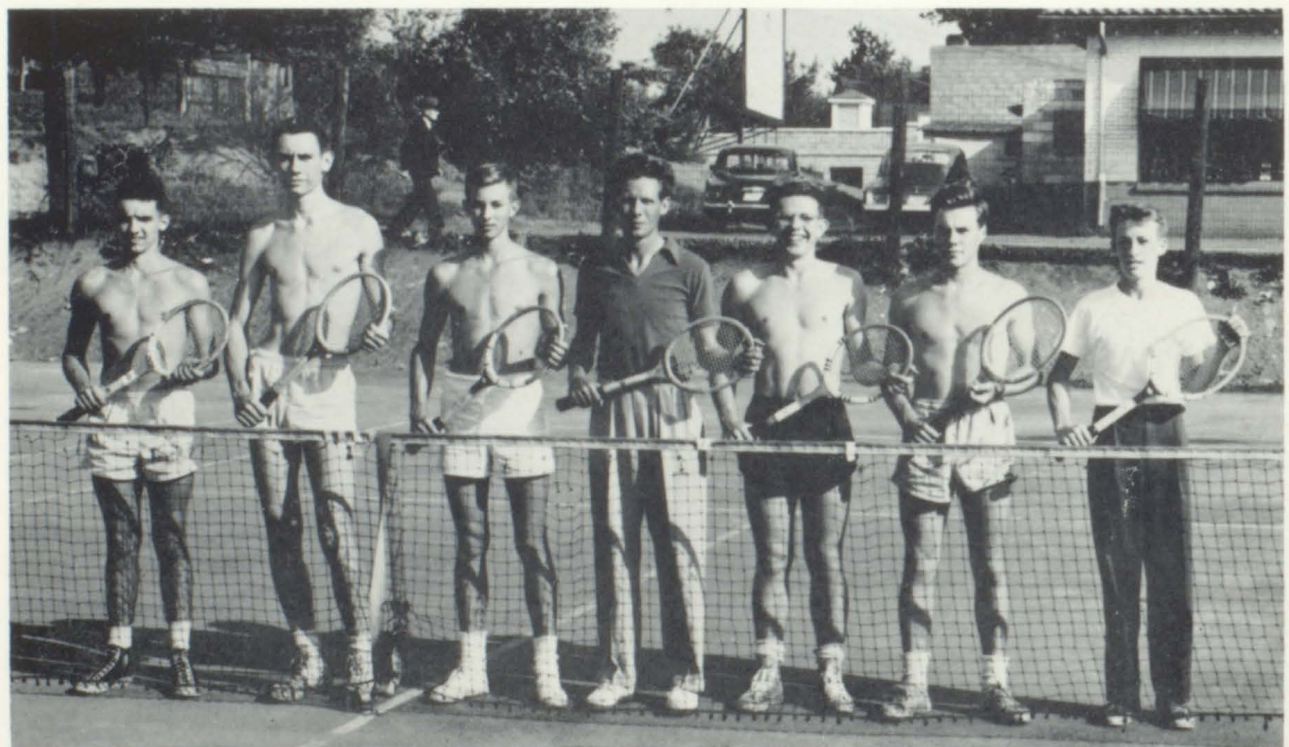
BASEBALL

Tennessee High has a club for every interest. No student is barred from membership in any club, except where the number is limited for the purpose of efficiency. Our clubs are divided into five groups—Service, Character, Hobby, Class, and Honor Clubs.

We have six service clubs. These clubs serve the whole school by their efforts. The Maroon and White and Cadmus Club put out the school publications; the Library Council helps make the library one of the finest; the Junior Red Cross not only serves us, but the whole nation; and the Advisory Council and Student Body Officers help make and carry out the policies of the school.

The Character Clubs are meant to build character and promote friendliness. These clubs have parties and projects and are considered the social clubs of our school. There are three of these clubs for the boys of Tennessee High School, the Key Club, sponsored by the Bristol Kiwanis Club; Jr. Civitan, sponsored by the Senior Civitans; and the Boys' Hi-Y, sponsored by the Y.M.C.A. of our city. The Maroon Maskers, our dramatics club at Tennessee High School, has long been one of our favorite Hobby Clubs. They present skits and plays and help with our class produc-

tions. The boys who are interested in sports such as hunting and fishing have banded together into the Sportsman Club, one of our more recently organized clubs. The Photography Club members share their knowledge and cameras as they learn to make and develop better pictures. Our students have many other hobbies and talents, but the club schedule is already very crowded.

The Tennessee High Class Clubs meet once a week or every two weeks during their class periods with interesting programs designed to give a colorful note to the subject. Of these, the Trade and Industry Club is perhaps the most active. All the students who take Diversified Occupations belong to this club. 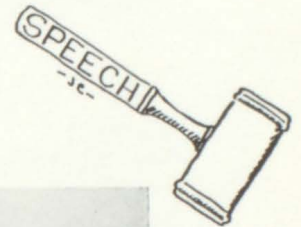
