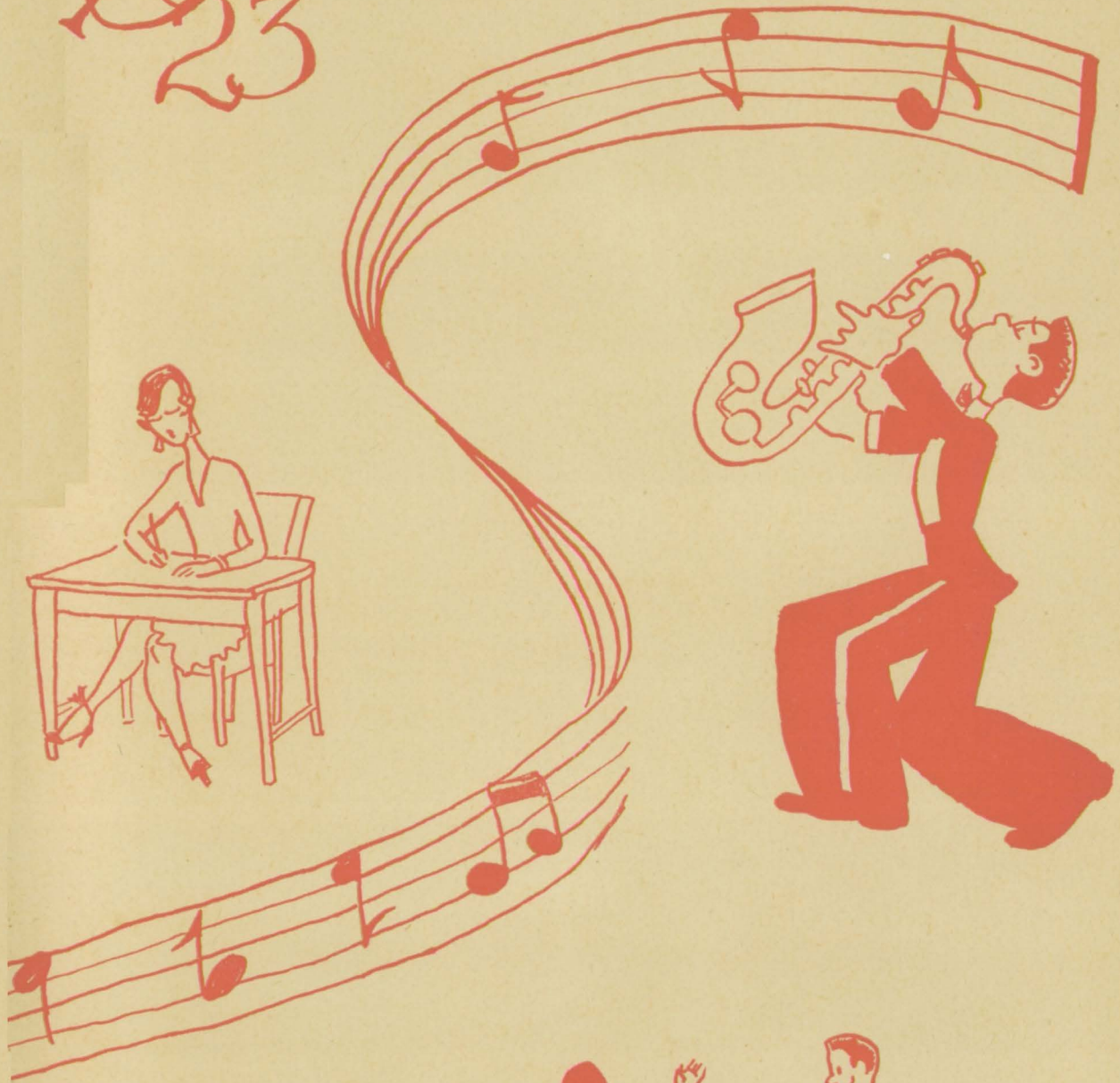

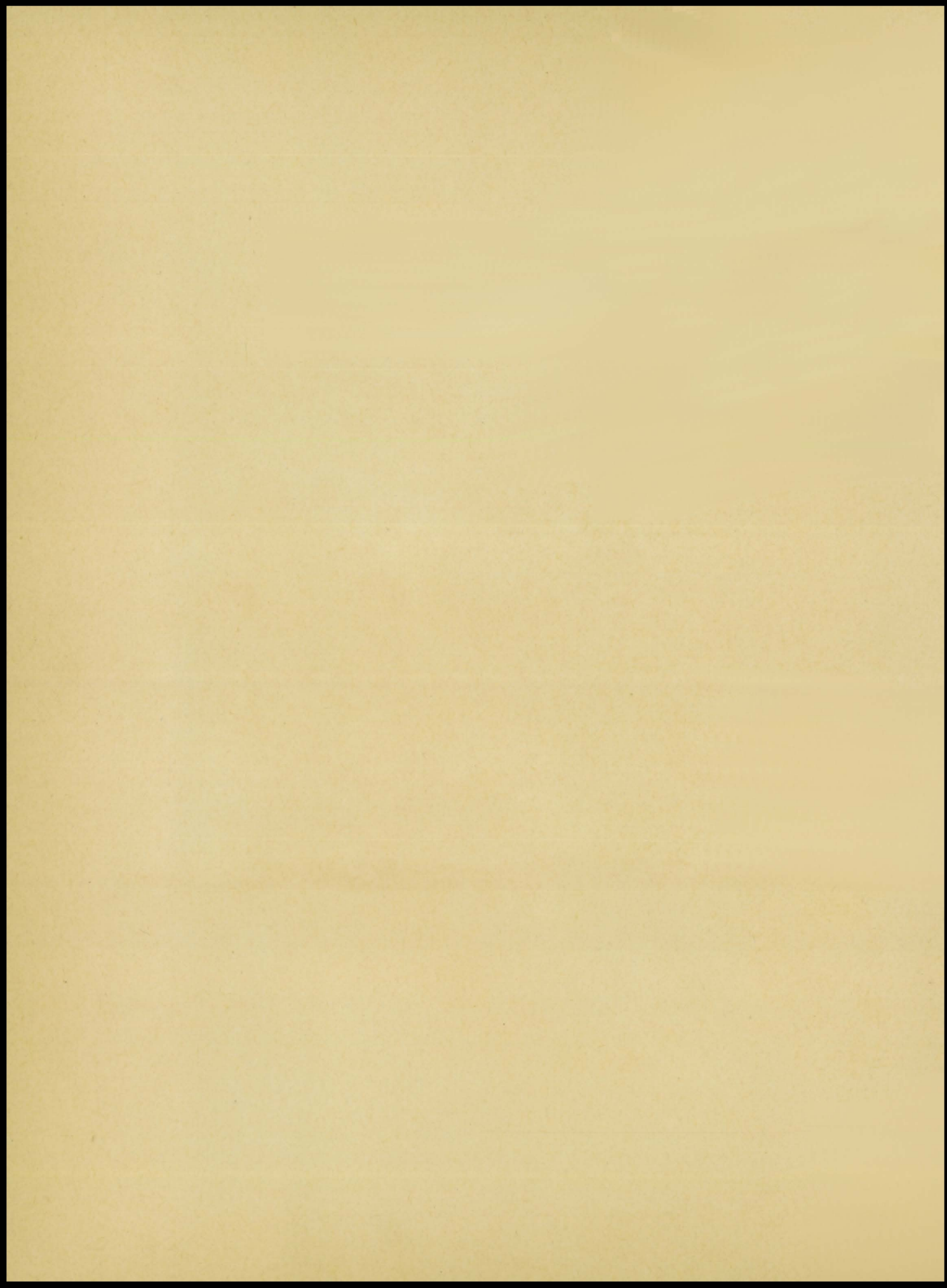

When you and your children look over this annual thirty years from now, we hope you will enjoy it and at the same time see the marks of the progress that is characteristic of Tennessee High School.

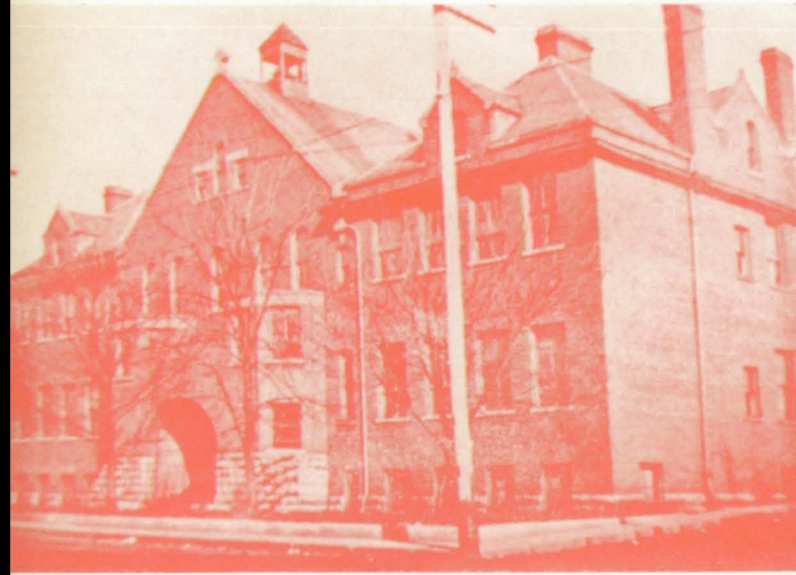

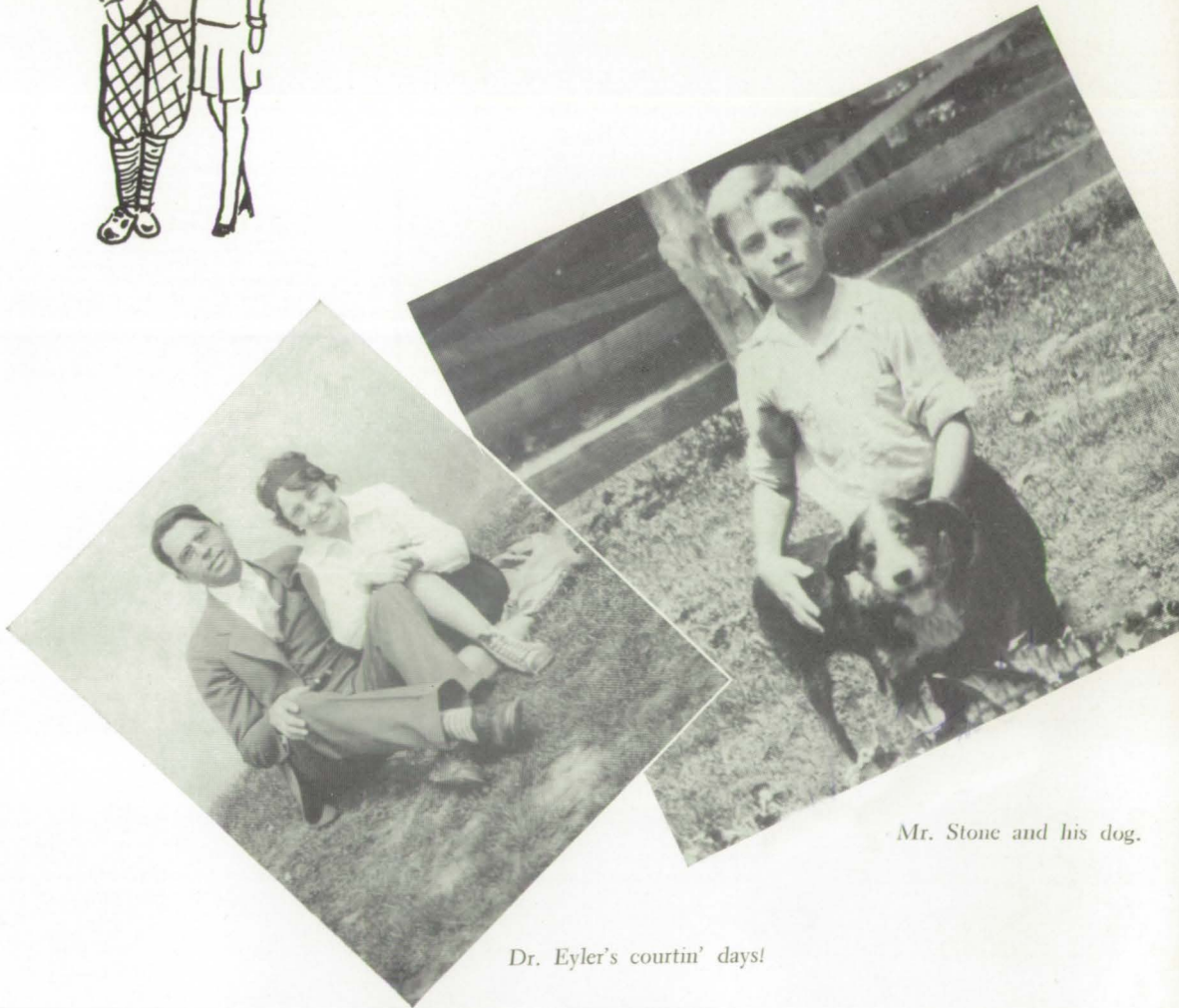

DR. C. M. EYLER

Dr. Eyler has been with us since August of 1946 when he arrived to take the job of Superintendent of the Bristol Tennessee Public Schools.

Dr. Eyler has an inexhaustible supply of energy and finds no undertaking too difficult. He is liked and admired by students, faculty, and others who have had a chance to meet and know him.

Dr. Eyler graduated from the University of Georgia and received his master's degree at Columbia University. He spent the winter of 1929-1930 in England.

For 16 years he was at Milligan College where he was Dean of Men; he was head of the English department and coached basketball.

From 1942 until 1945 he served his country at Lt. Col. in the Army. In 1945-1946 he received his Ph.D. at Peabody College before coming to Bristol.

“Memories

Although we, the crew of '52, realize that “what is done cannot be undone” and that “art is long and time is fleeting,” we would like to take a few minutes to recall our adventures and to account for our days aboard this good Viking ship, Tennessee High, before dropping anchor on our final voyage.

In May of '49, our class graduated from Tennessee Junior High School. That was a great day for us, and at that time we felt as though we had conquered the world of knowledge. However, after beginning our new classes as sophomores at B.T.H.S., we realized that there would be many, many, long hours spent in classes and study before we could even begin to hold our own in the world.

In the fall of '49, we came aboard this vessel as deck hands, we were given by the upperclassmen, by the faculty, and by the administration a warm and cordial welcome, which we shall long remember. Their kindness and helpfulness even overshadowed initiations, and made us realize that even though high school life was strange and new to us, as our sophomore poet, Jim Potect, said, “we weren't underdogs at all.”

In the spring of 1950, we closed the school year with a sophomore outing at Hungry Mother Park. This outing bound us more tightly together as a class that was to spend another two years in study and in activities aboard our great Viking ship.

We fully realized our status as juniors on that day, in the fall of 1950, when we ordered our class rings, and anxiously waited, day by day, until the rings were delivered in December. No one could have displayed these symbols of Tennessee High with greater pride.

During Junior Week in May, we honored the seniors at a tea and at a dance following our play, *Cheaper by the Dozen*, which was capably presented with honest pride to the public on May 4. Then having passed nine months as a junior class,

we dug into our books and passed our examinations to become dignified and learned seniors.

In the fall of the year nineteen hundred fifty-one, we entered school just as we had been doing for the past eleven years, but this year we were seated in senior homerooms.

We, thru long days of labor,
And nights devoid of rest,
Had gained the highest summit,
And now stood on the crest.

Having arrived at seniority, we found it practically the same as the other years, but now as we look on our school days, we can see that it was during this year that the finishing touches and accents were added to the masterpiece that had been molded and shaped for twelve years.

Also during the excitement of the many senior elections and re-elections, of presenting the Senior Play, *Nothing but the Truth*, of trying on caps and gowns, or ordering cards and invitations, of decorating for and of attending the Senior Prom, life-long friendships were tempered and placed upon lasting foundations.

Now, as our school days become history, we must drop anchor on these memories, and each of us must captain our own vessel and steer it over the rough Sea of Life. May each of us take with us an adequate supply of knowledge, faith, common sense, and integrity, taken from the lessons we have found in our text books, and in the characters and personalities of our beloved and patient teachers.

As we disembark from our final Viking voyage to take charge of the vessel entrusted to our care by God, the Creator, may we each set our sails high, to be caught in the strong winds of friendship, success, and happiness and to carry us safely and surely into and over the Sea of Life.

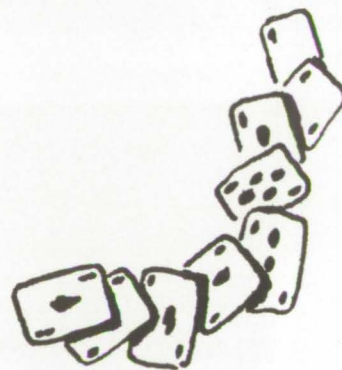

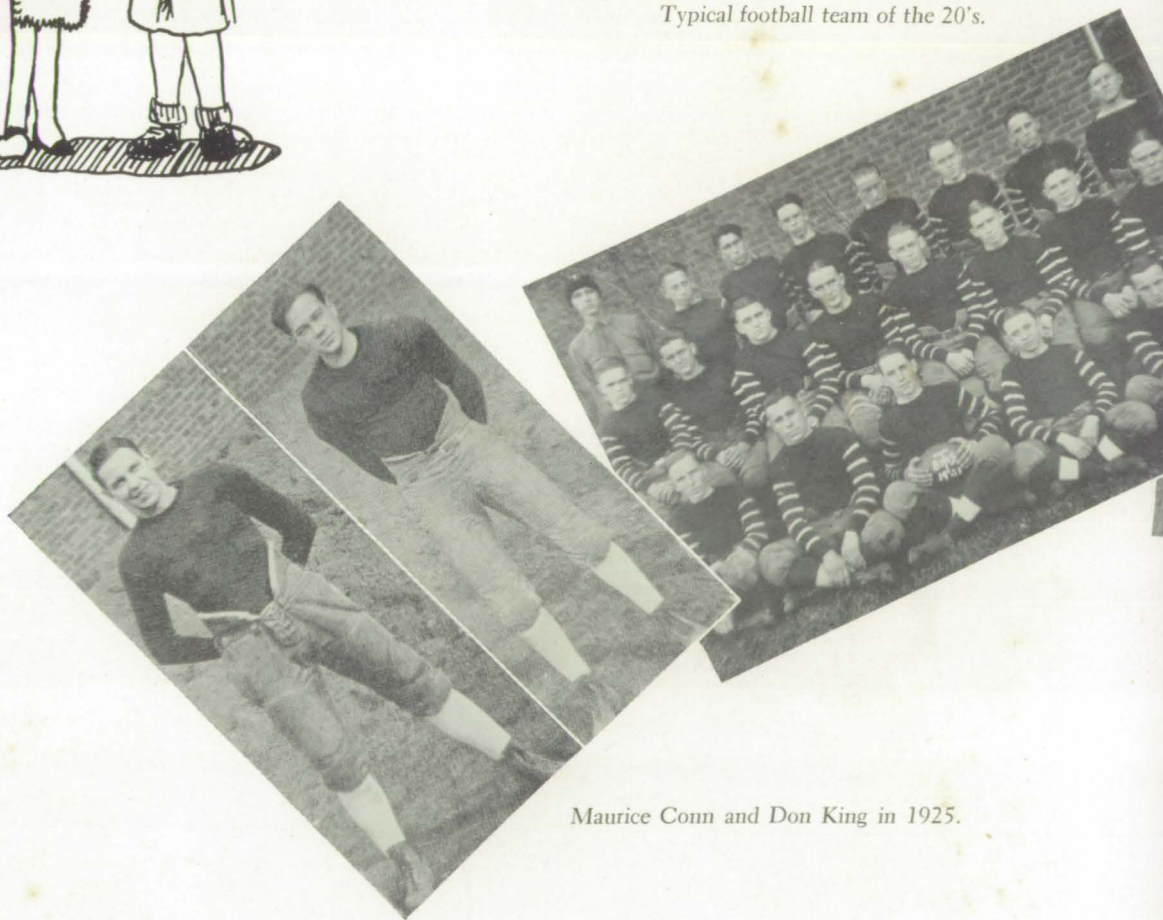

FOOTBALL

The Tennessee High Vikings didn't fare too well on the gridiron this year, having a seasonal record of two wins, eight defeats, and one tie.

One of the main reasons for their sharp letdown, after last year's Big Five Conference Champs, was the lack of reserve strength and experience. With only five veterans from last year's team, the Vikings were not expected to field as good a club as last year.

The Vikings, led by Co-Captains Don Harkleroad and Dave Tolbert, opened the season as hosts to Morristown and tied the favored visitors, 6-6.

Tennessee then played Fulton Tech, and won 13-6.

The Vikings played host to the Tazewell Bulldogs and came up on the short end of a 32-7 score.

The Vikings went ahead with a 26-12 win over an equally inexperienced Chattanooga City eleven at Chattanooga.

The Vikings opened defense of their Big Five Conference crown with a loss to the Hilltoppers of Johnson City, 12-0 in a hard-fought game.

Elizabethton, with its state-high school band, came to town and walloped the Vikings 32-0.

Erwin won out over the Vikings at Erwin, after the Vikings took an early 6-0 lead, by a score of 27-6.

Tennessee wound up their Big Five Conference slate against Kingsport with a heartbreaking 32-13 loss after a close first-half of play. It was the fourth big Five loss of the year for the Vikings.

The Vikings played host to the Oak Ridge Wildcats in the rain, snow, mud and cold and lost 39-7.

Finally the game everyone was waiting for came, the traditional clash with the Virginia High Bearcats. Tennessee played a fine game but, just as reserves and inexperience had plagued them all year, the Virginia game was no exception and the Vikings lost to the veteran Bearcats by a score of 26-6, thus concluding the 1951 season.

Don Harkleroad, Gene Estep and Dave Tolbert were on the All-City team. Tolbert won the Herb Cross trophy as outstanding linesman.

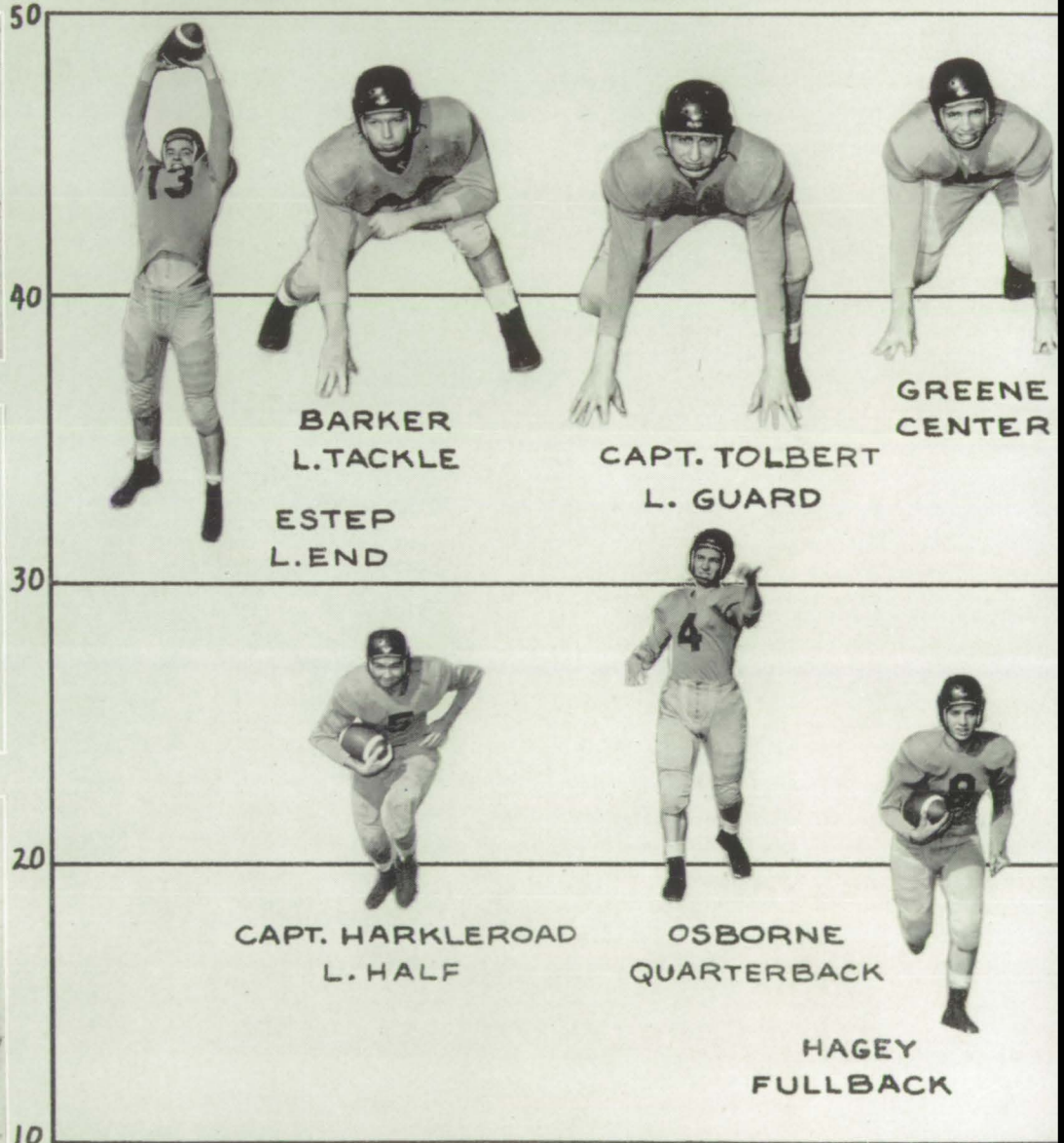

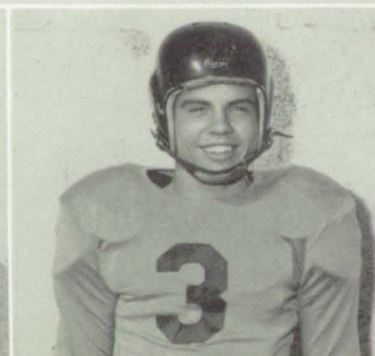

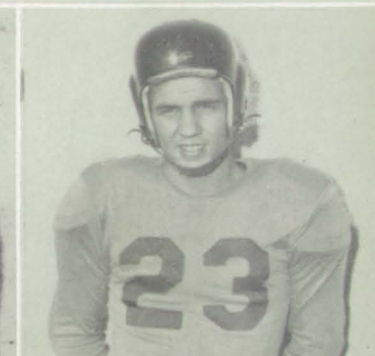

BASKETBALL

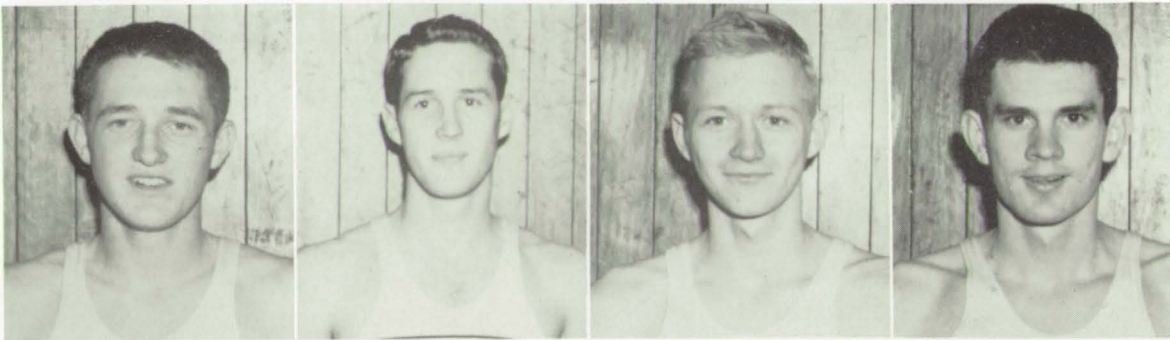

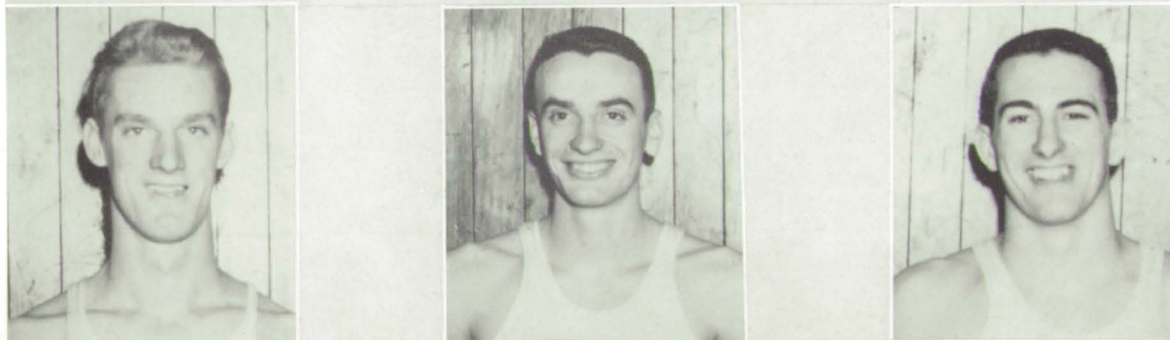

Five boys were taken to Oak Ridge to join the East Tennessee competition. In this meet, the two-mile relay team took third place.

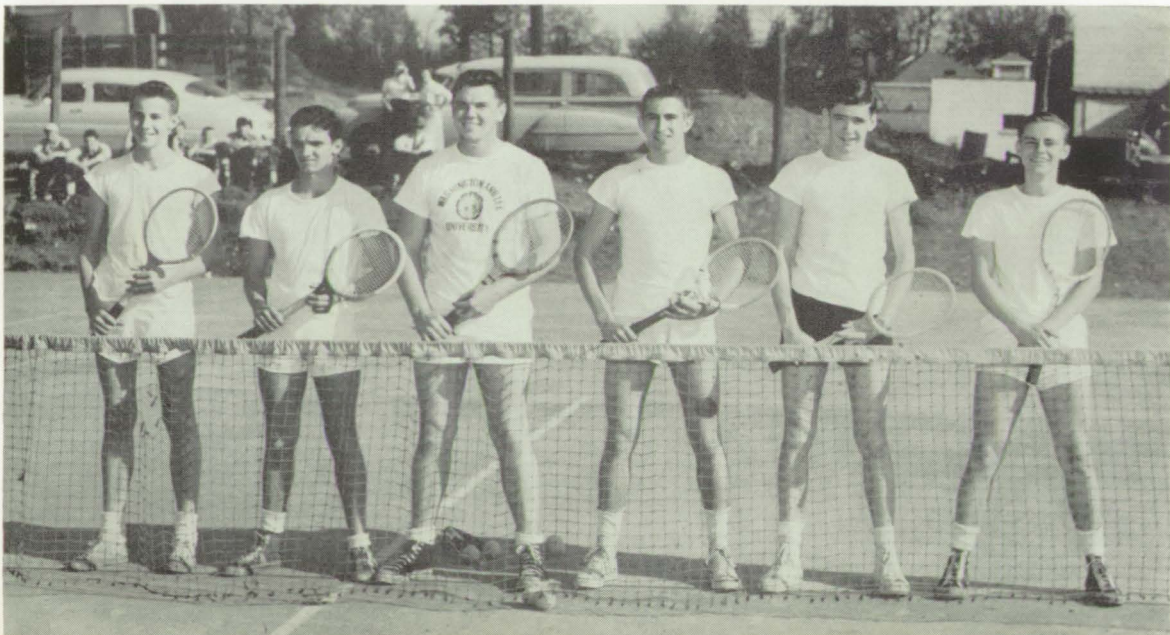
TENNIS

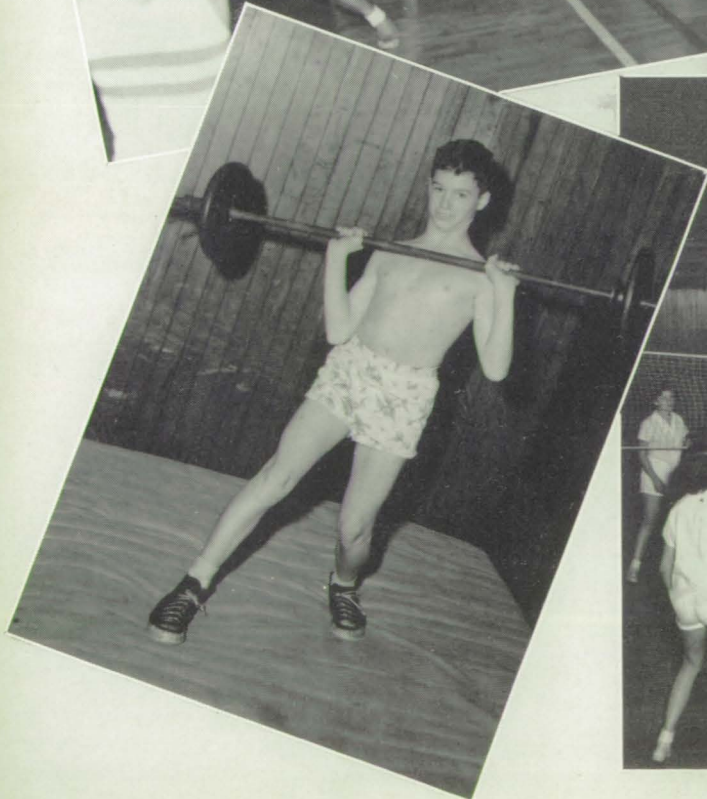

special program, for the entire student body.

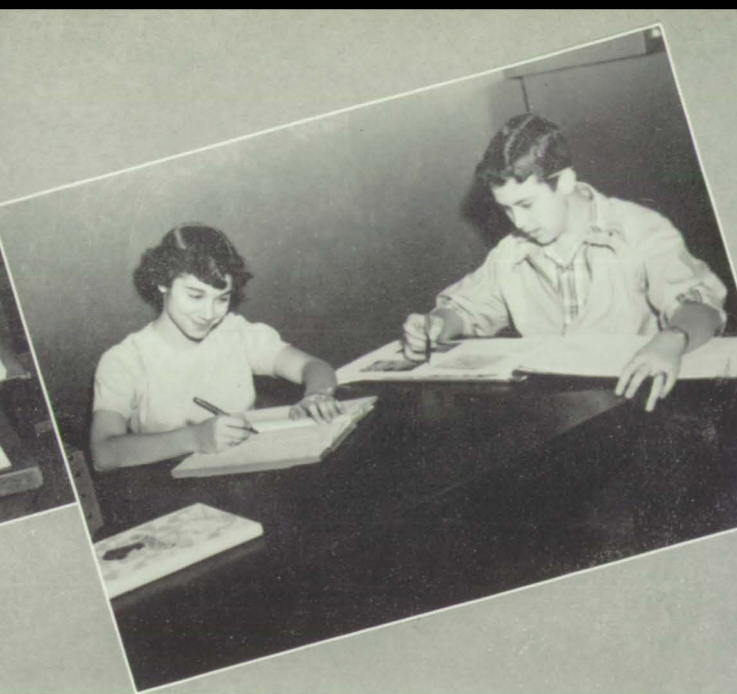

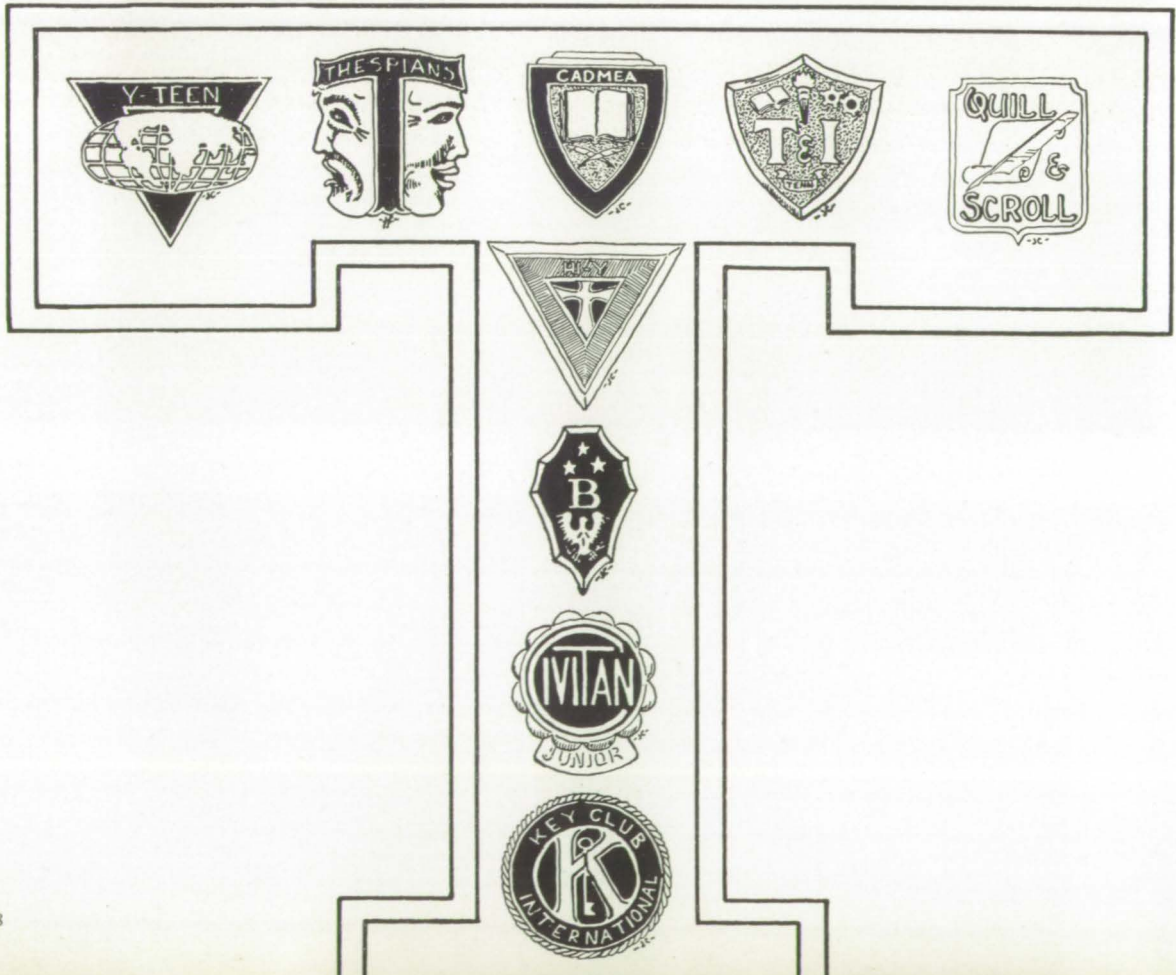

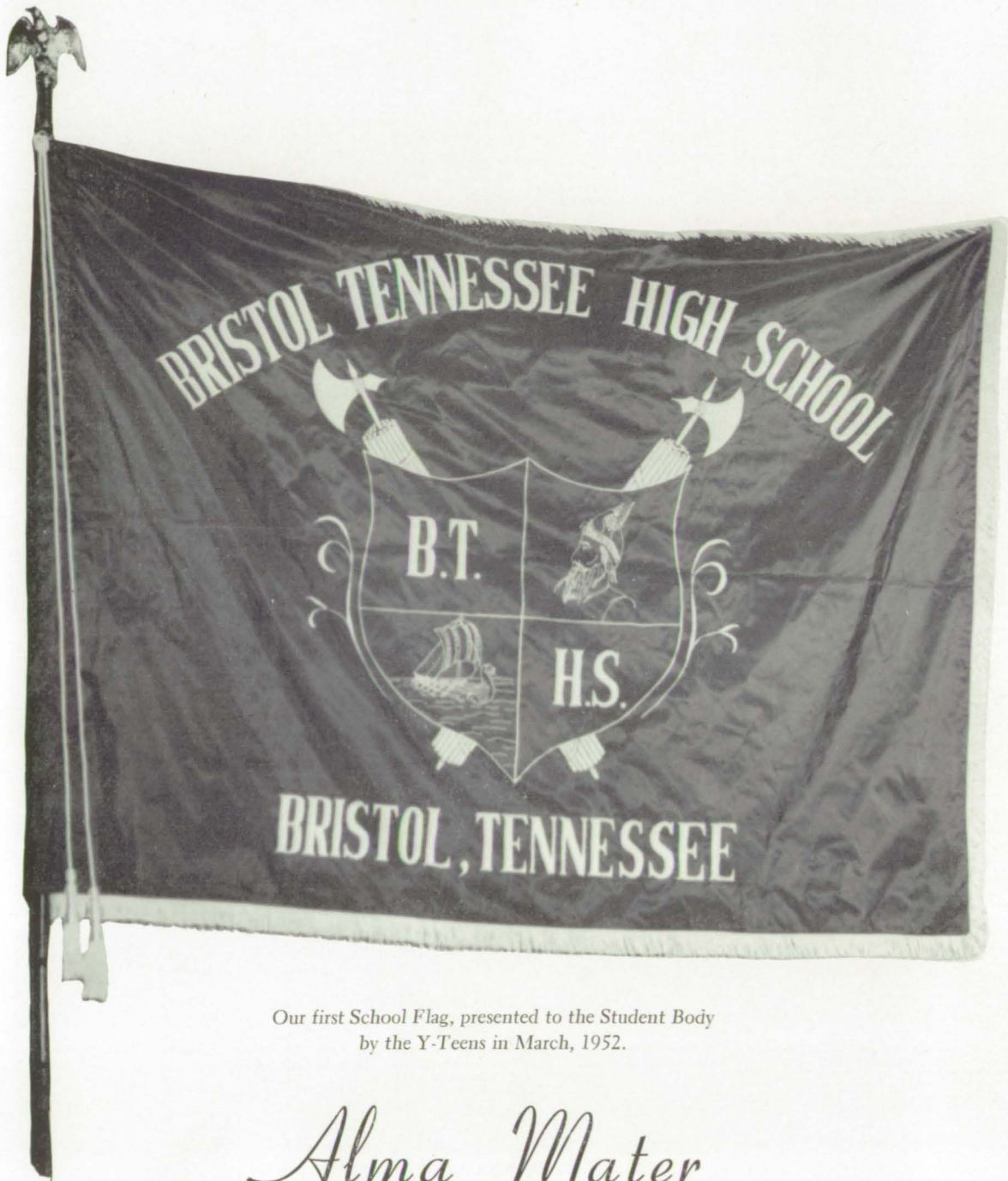
The club has also had joint meetings and joint projects with the Virginia High Key Club, and outings as well as our regular meetings.

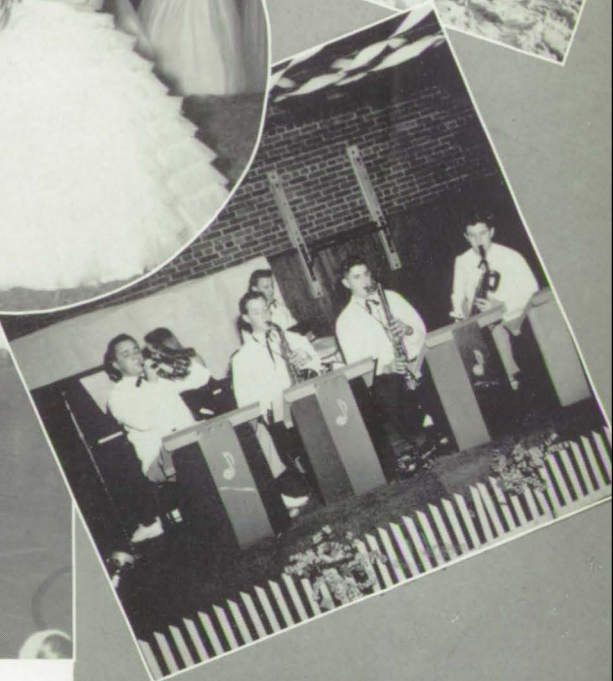
