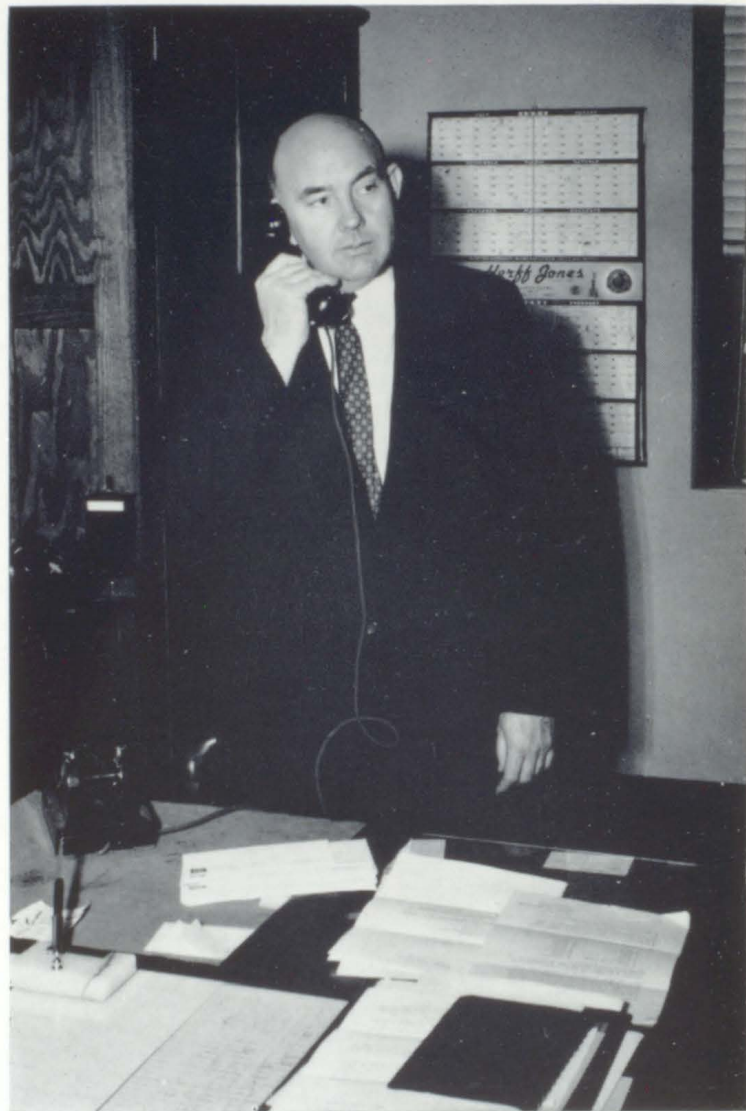
SUPERINTENDENT

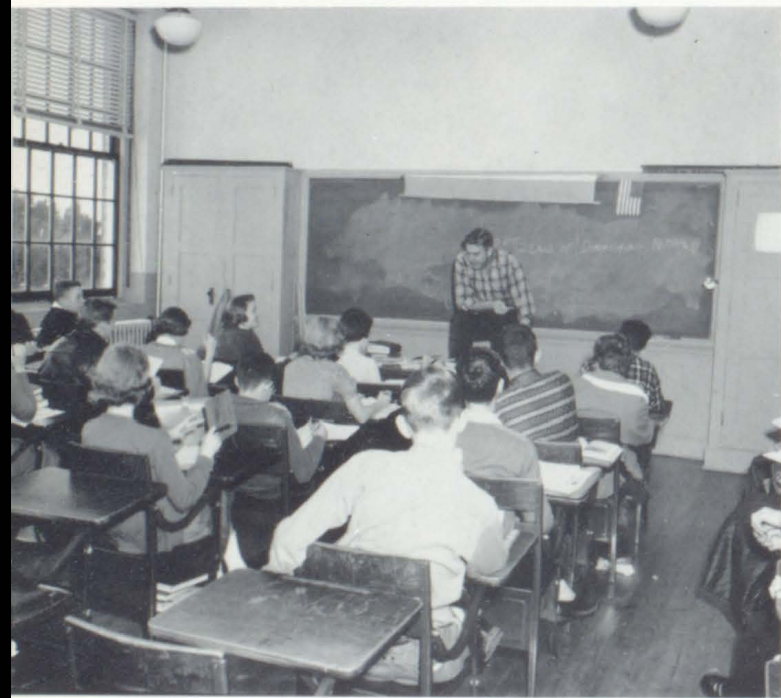

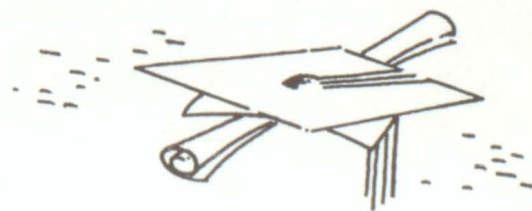


GRADUATION

SENIOR HISTORY

With Miss Peggy Marshall at the helm, they maintained a school spirit that seemed to contagiously affect the entire student body.

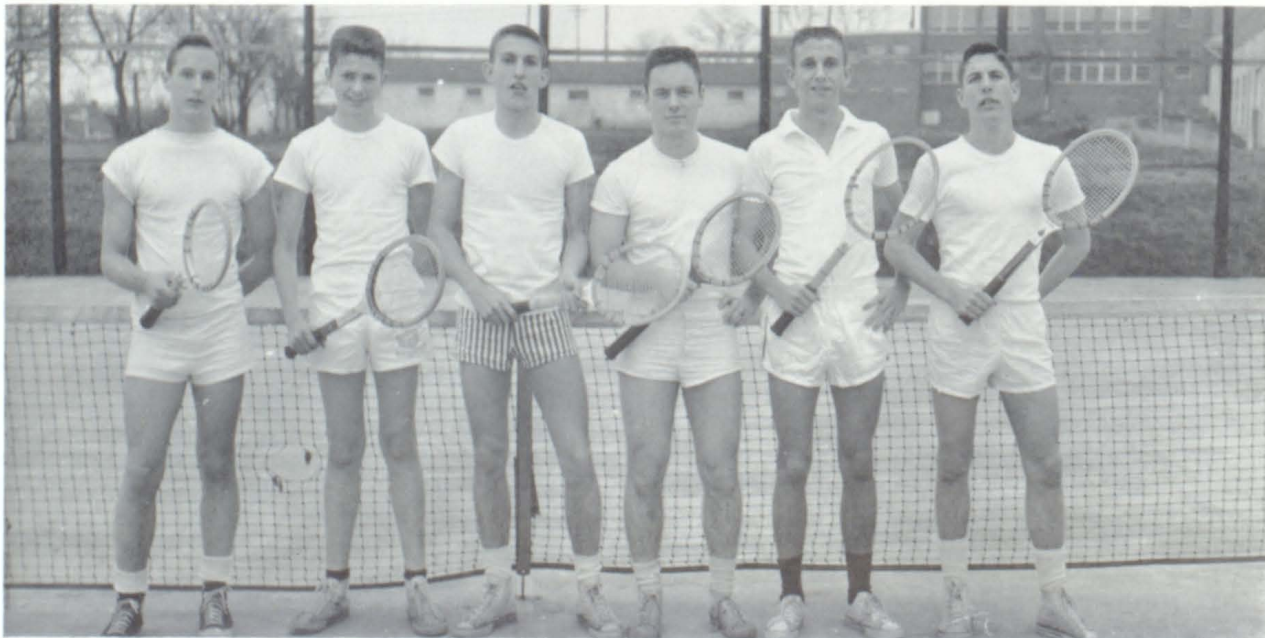

Picking up speed once again, the Vikings defeated Blountville, 52-46, Pennington Gap, 65-48, and Blountville again, 65-50.

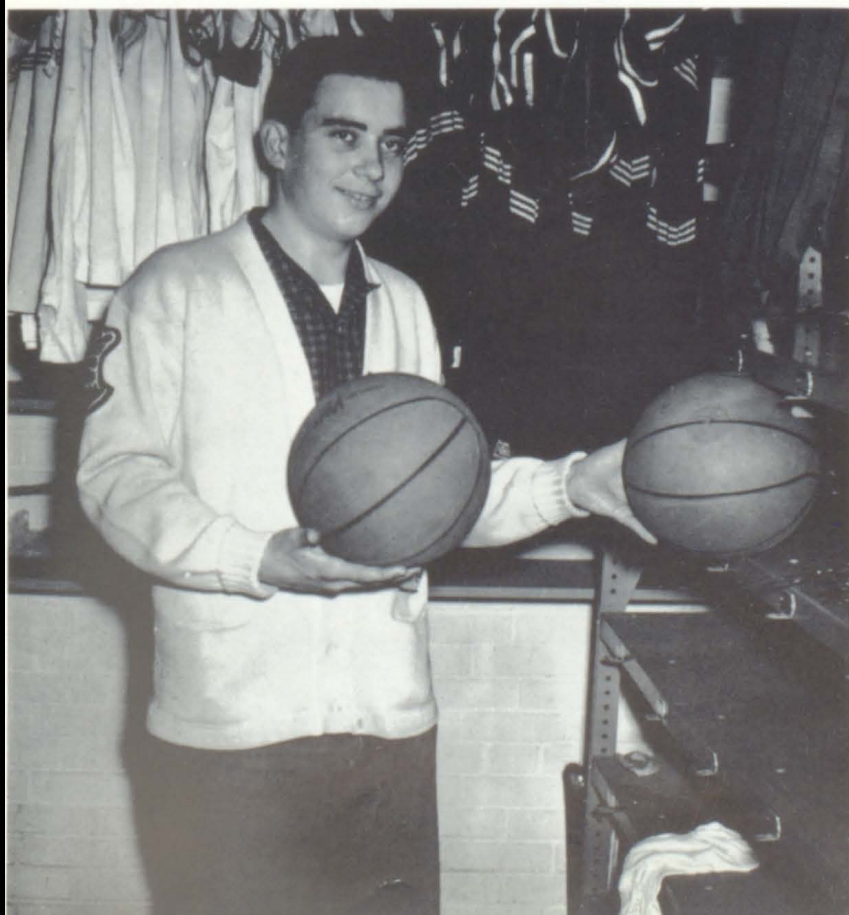
After having traveled to Kingsport, the Vikings were sent home with a 91-33 defeat at the hands of the Indians.

At home, before a capacity crowd, the Vikings fought the powerful Kingsport Indians in what was rated their best game of the season. The keyed-up Vikings yielded only in a heart-breaking overtime, 41-38.

The Vikings encountered a powerful Hampton team in the first round of the Regional Tournament, and met a hard fought defeat, 58-63.

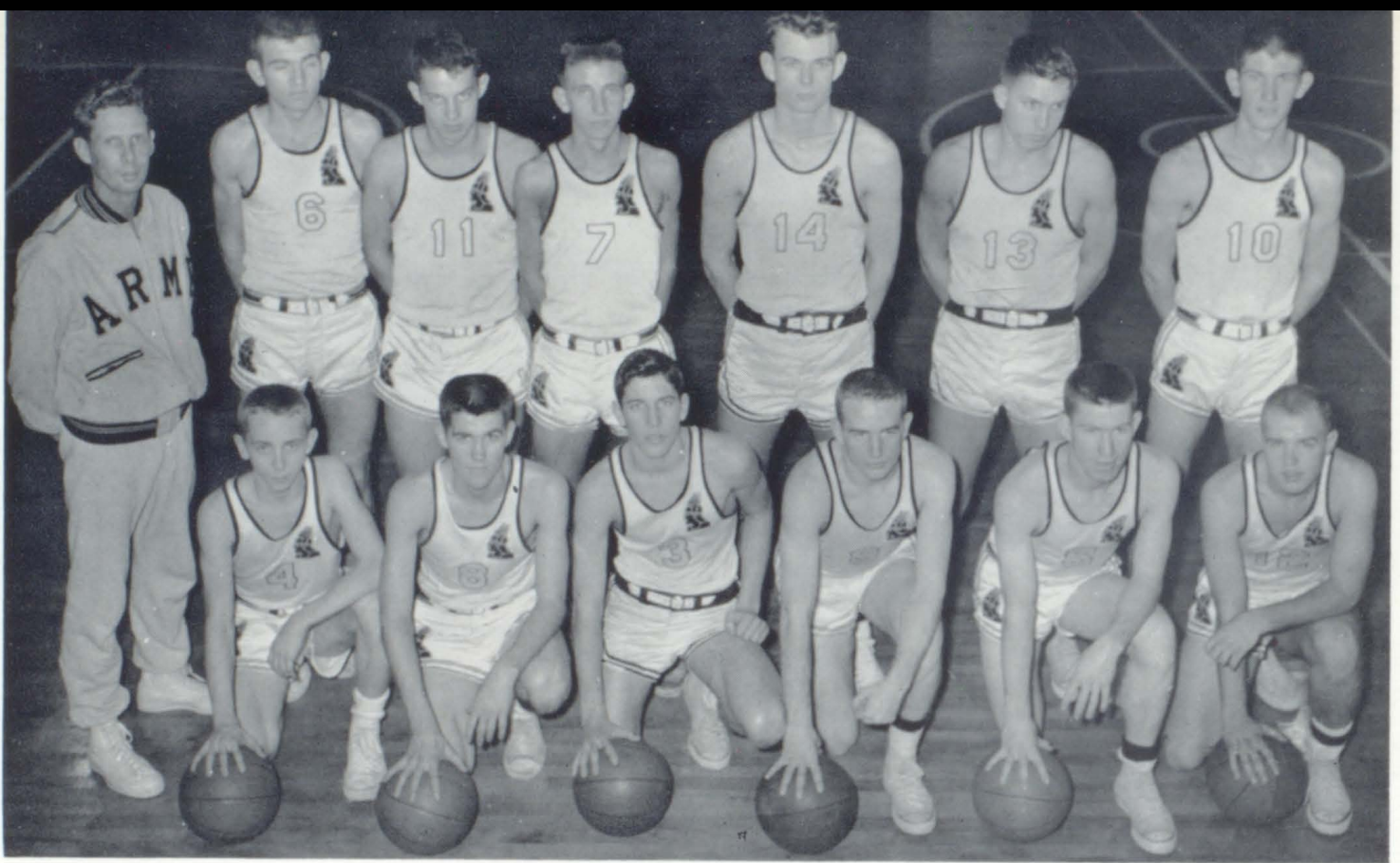

THE TENNESSEE HIGH SCHOOL CHORUS

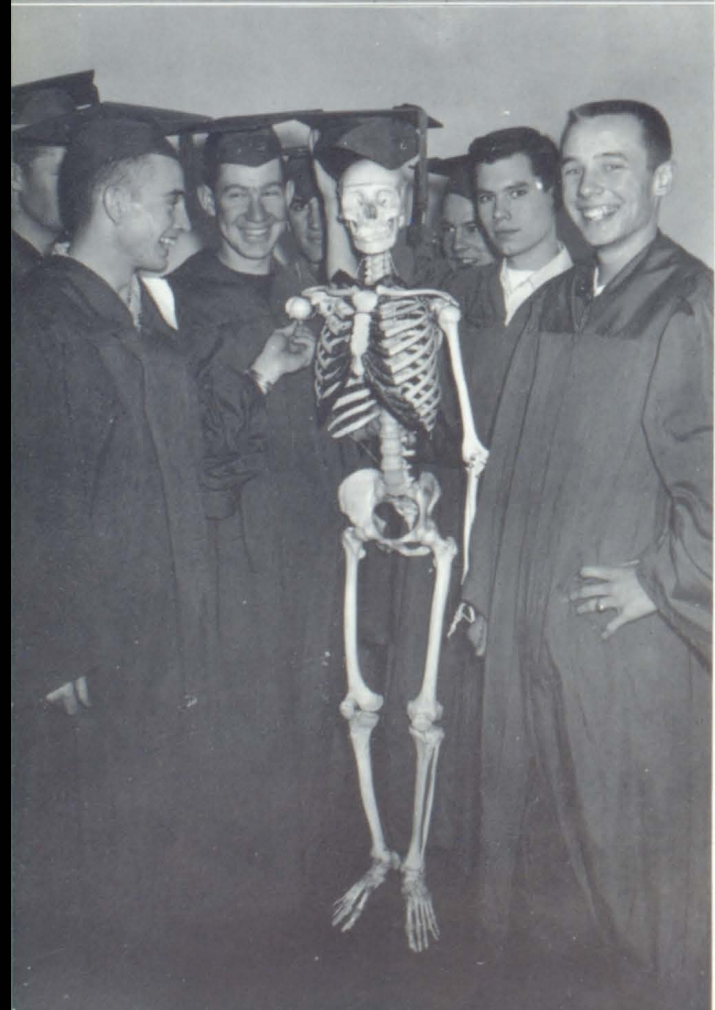
The Chorus enjoyed an eventful and enjoyable year of singing and merriment under the capable leadership of two directors.

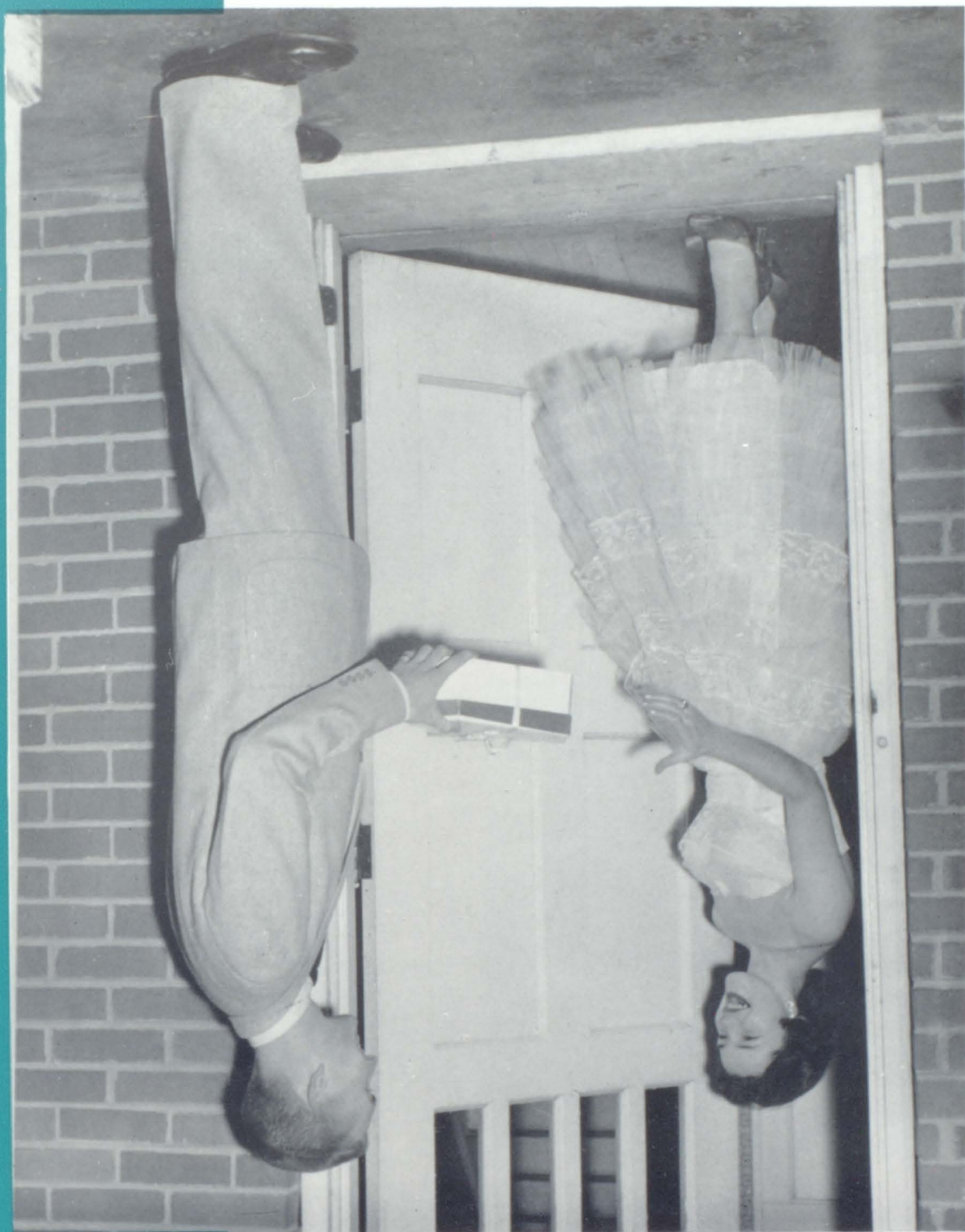




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PURPOSE
