FOREWORD

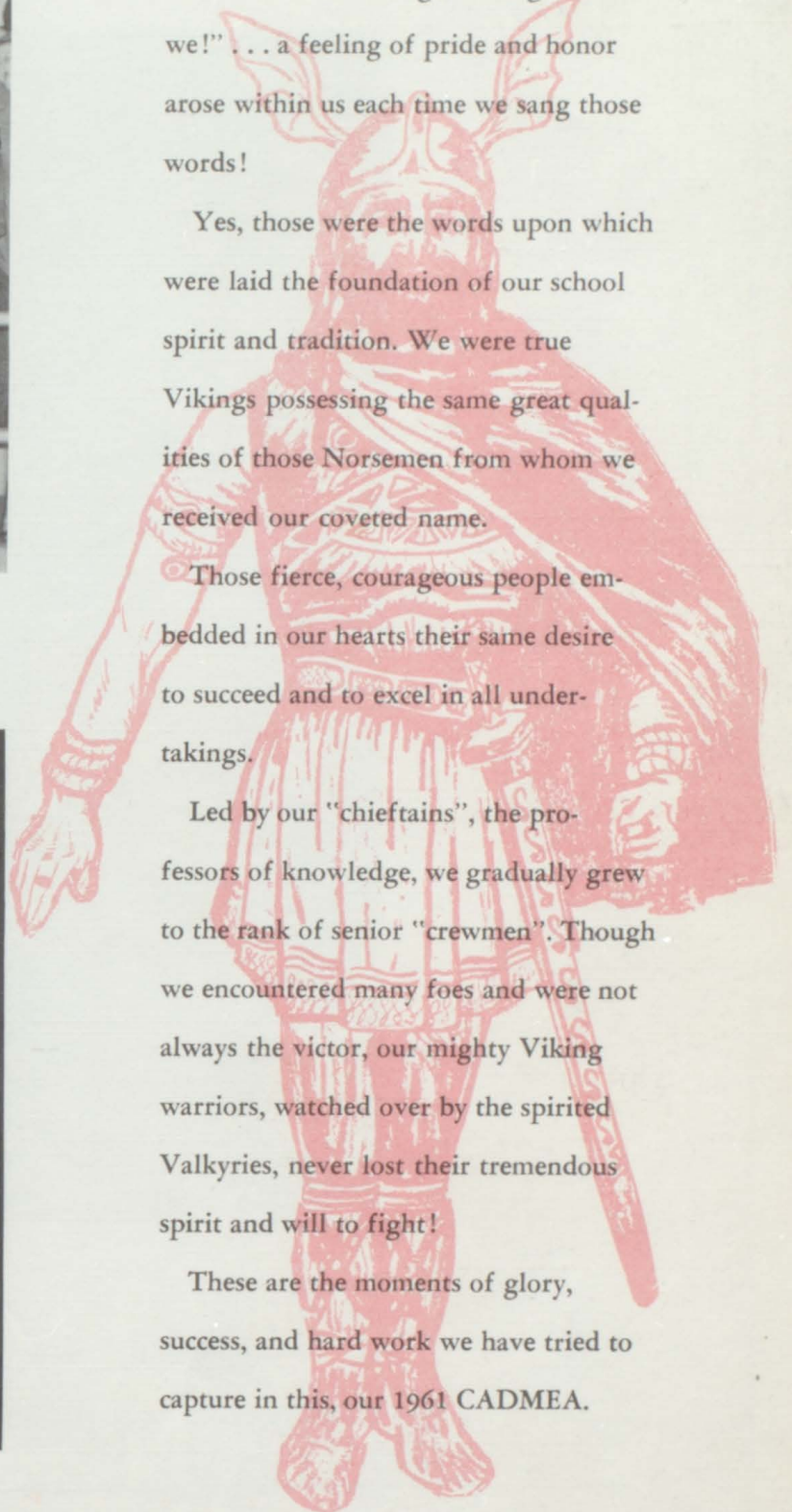
"We are the Vikings, Vikings are we!" . . . a feeling of pride and honor arose within us each time we sang those words!

In the first game of the season, this year's team, led by captains, Arvil Vance and Dick Shumaker, crushed an unsuspecting Coeburn 34-0.



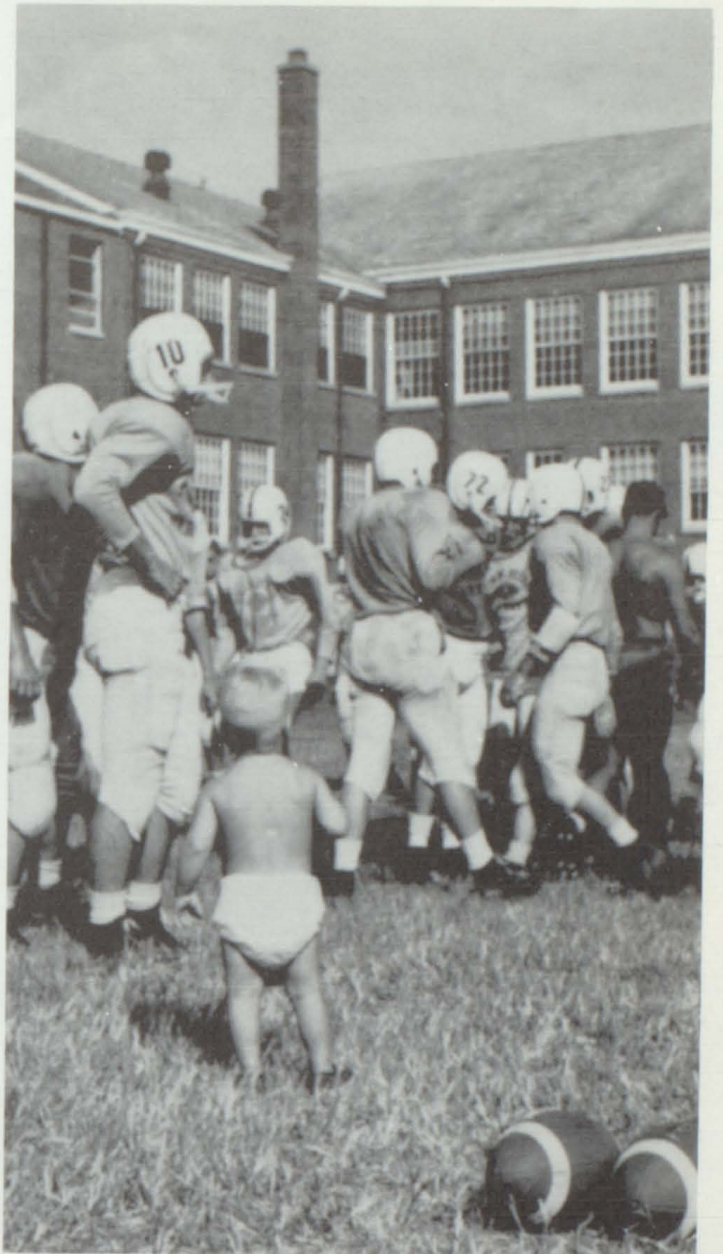

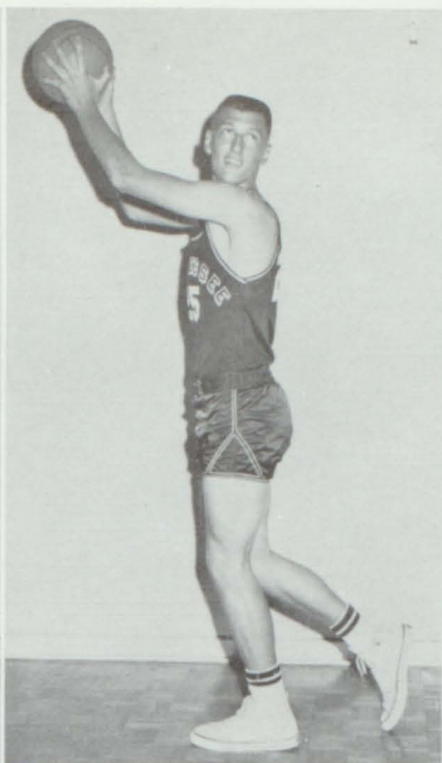
