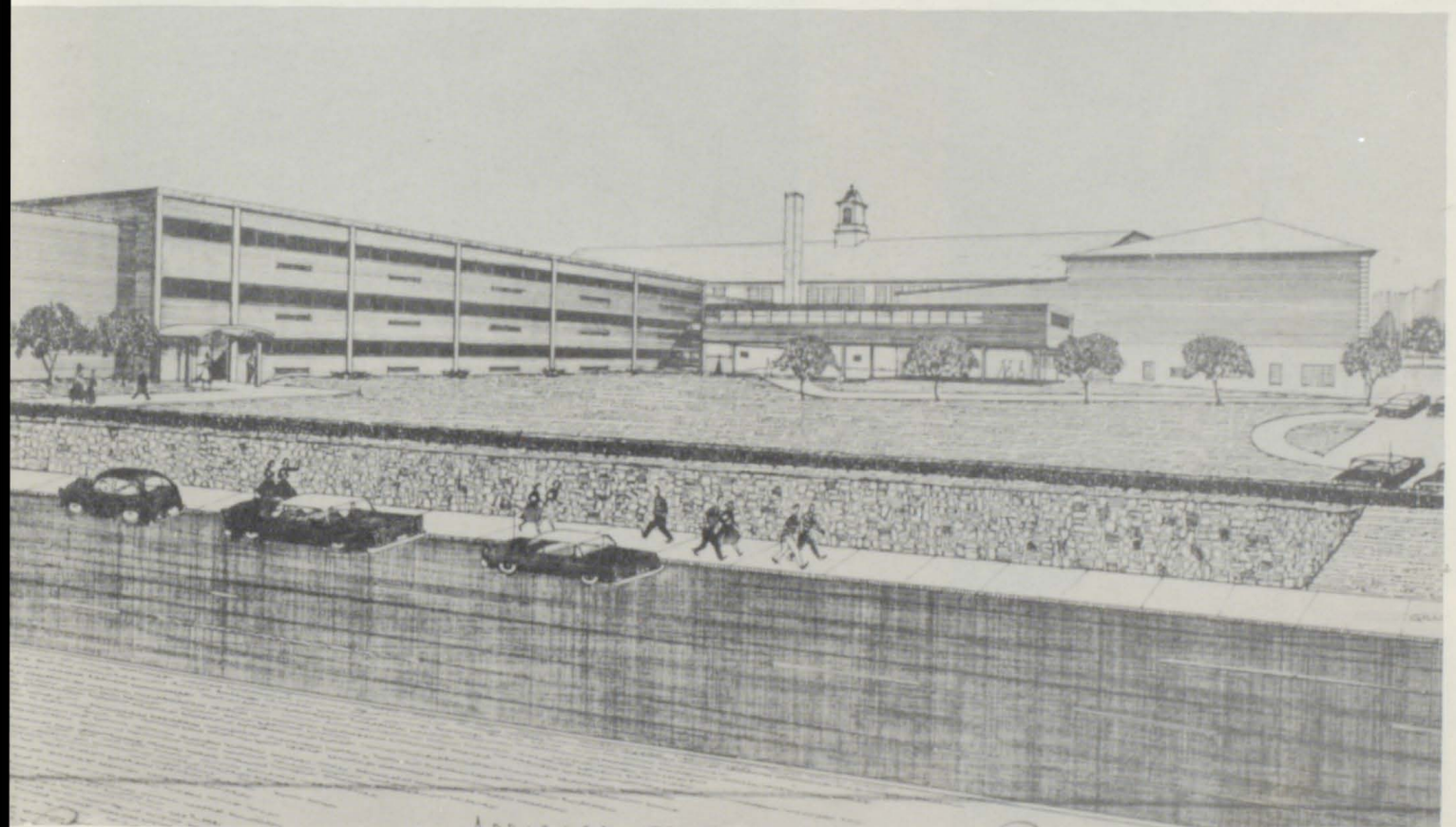
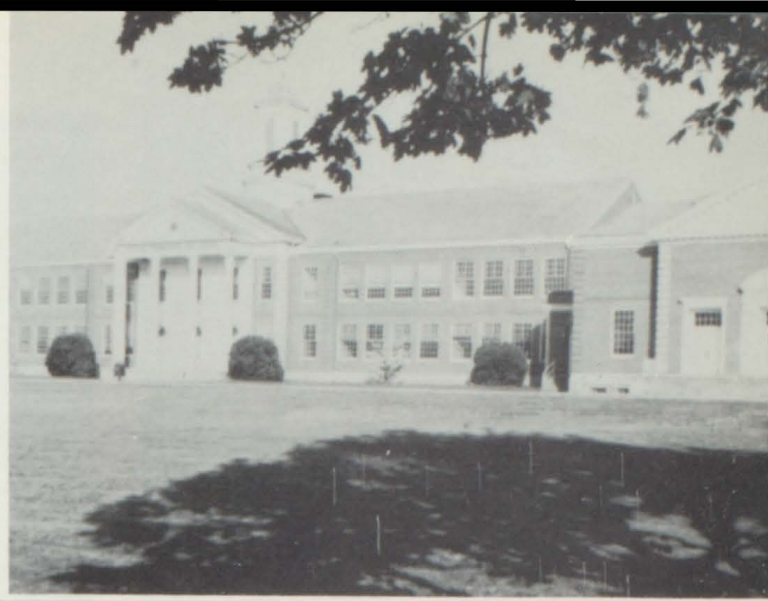
Traditions

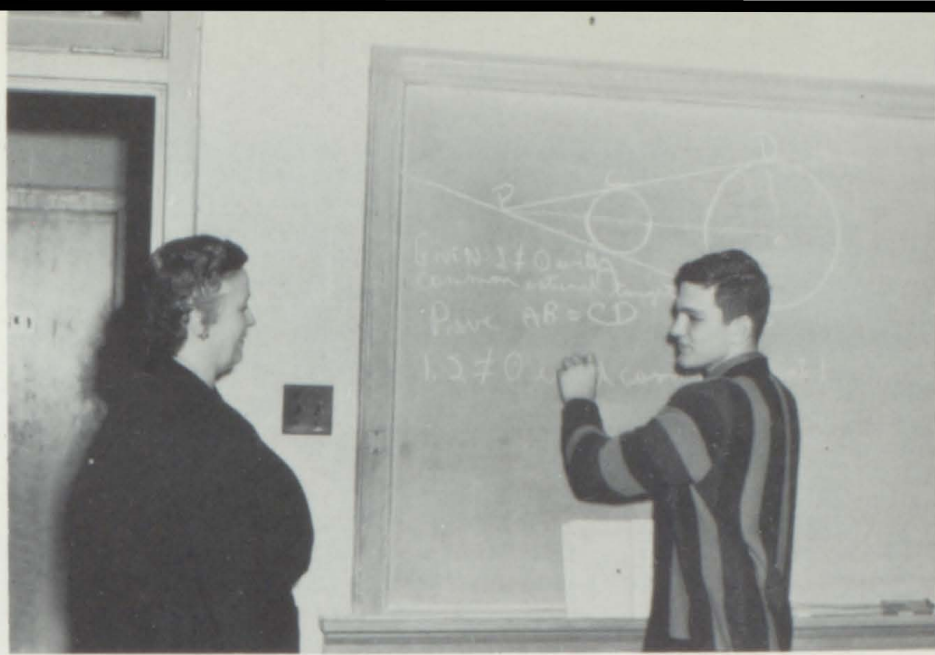

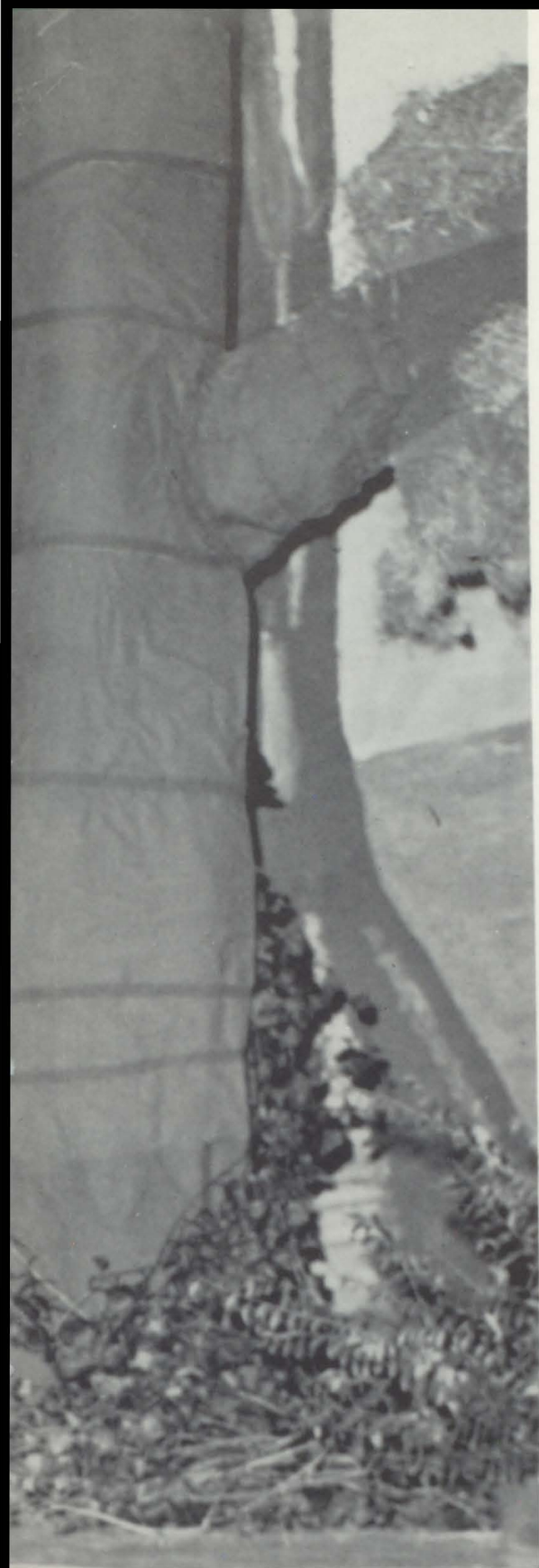

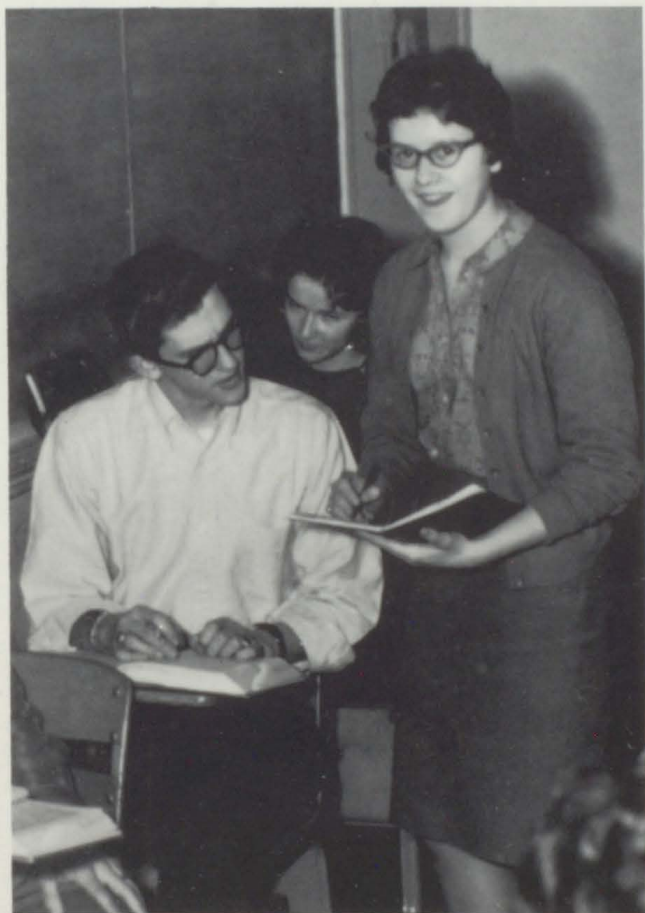

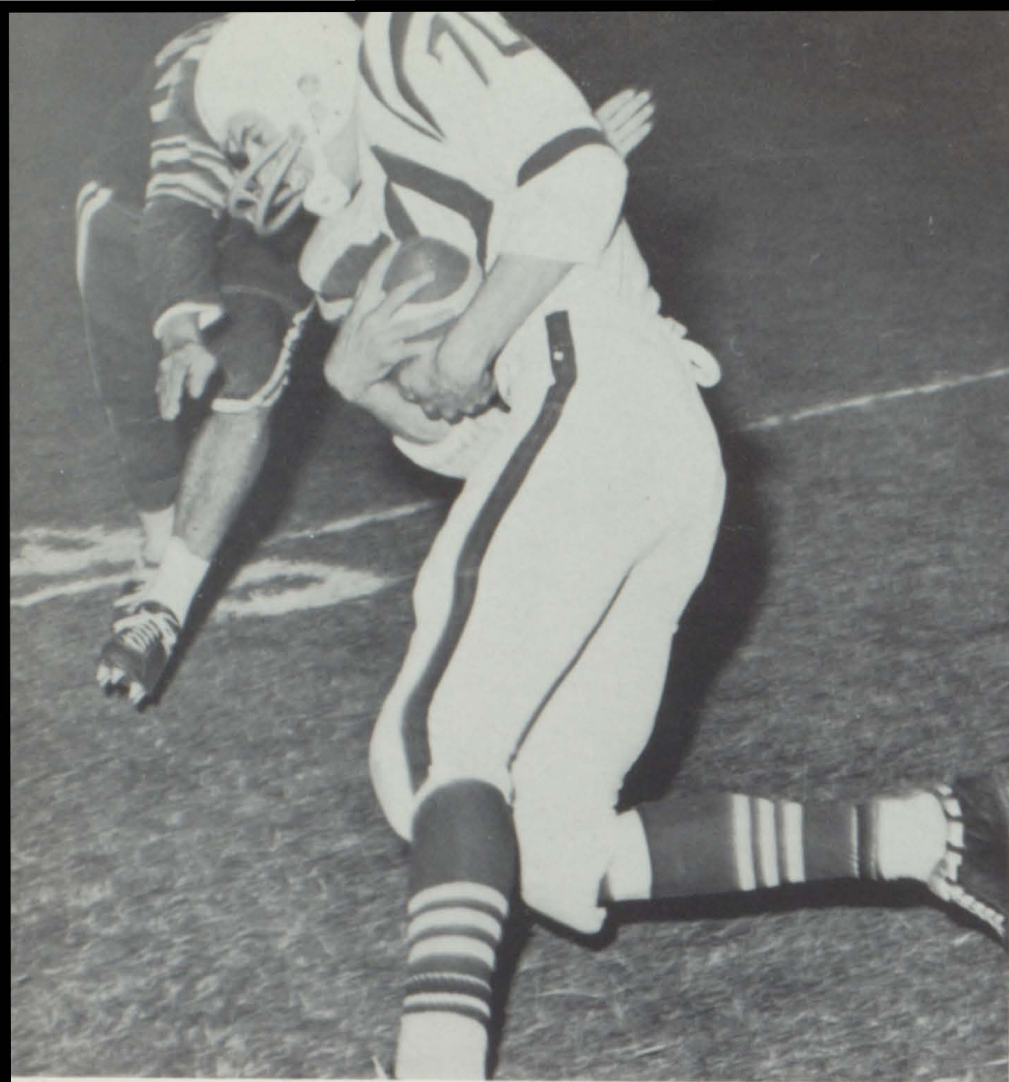
