

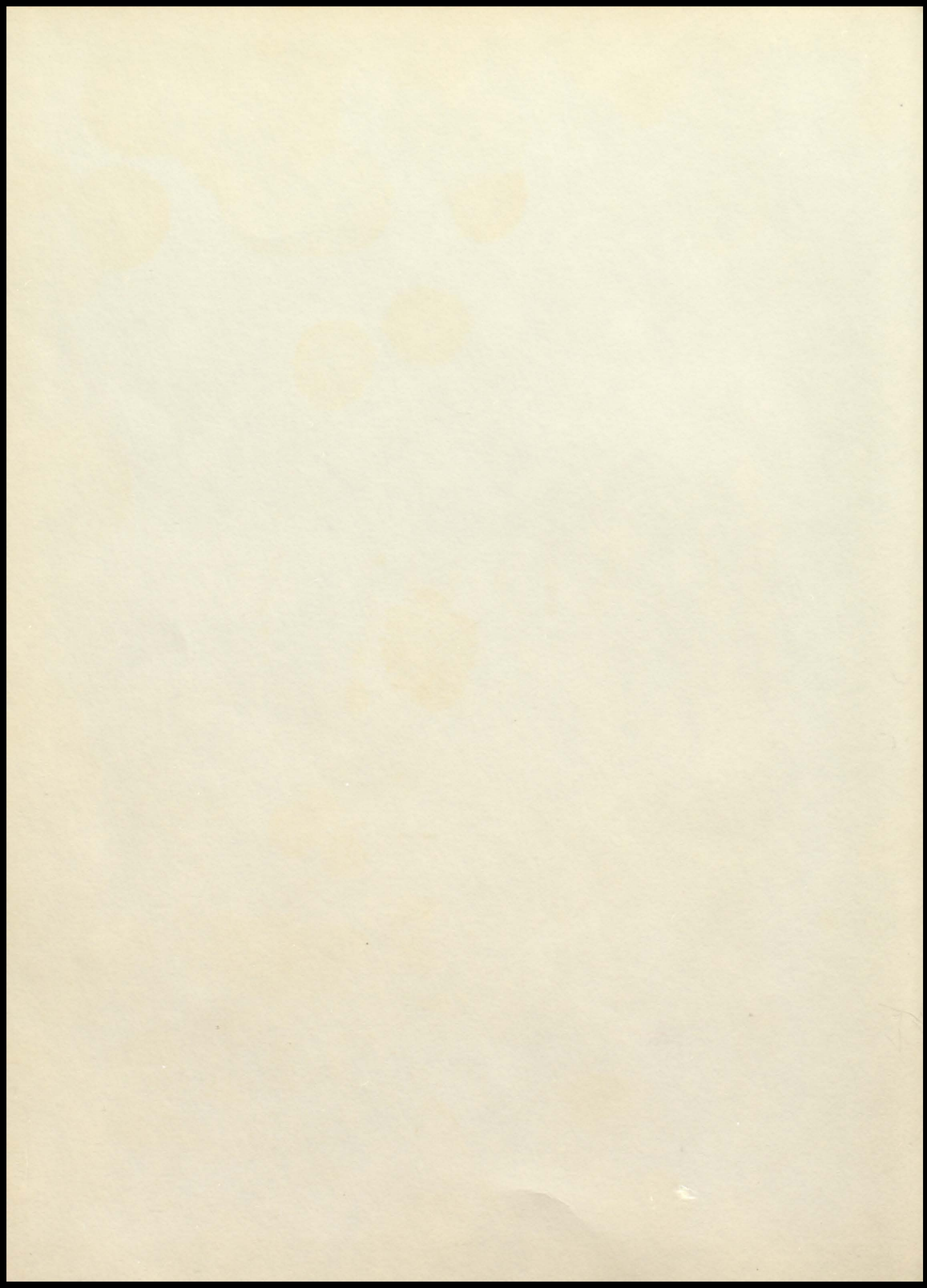

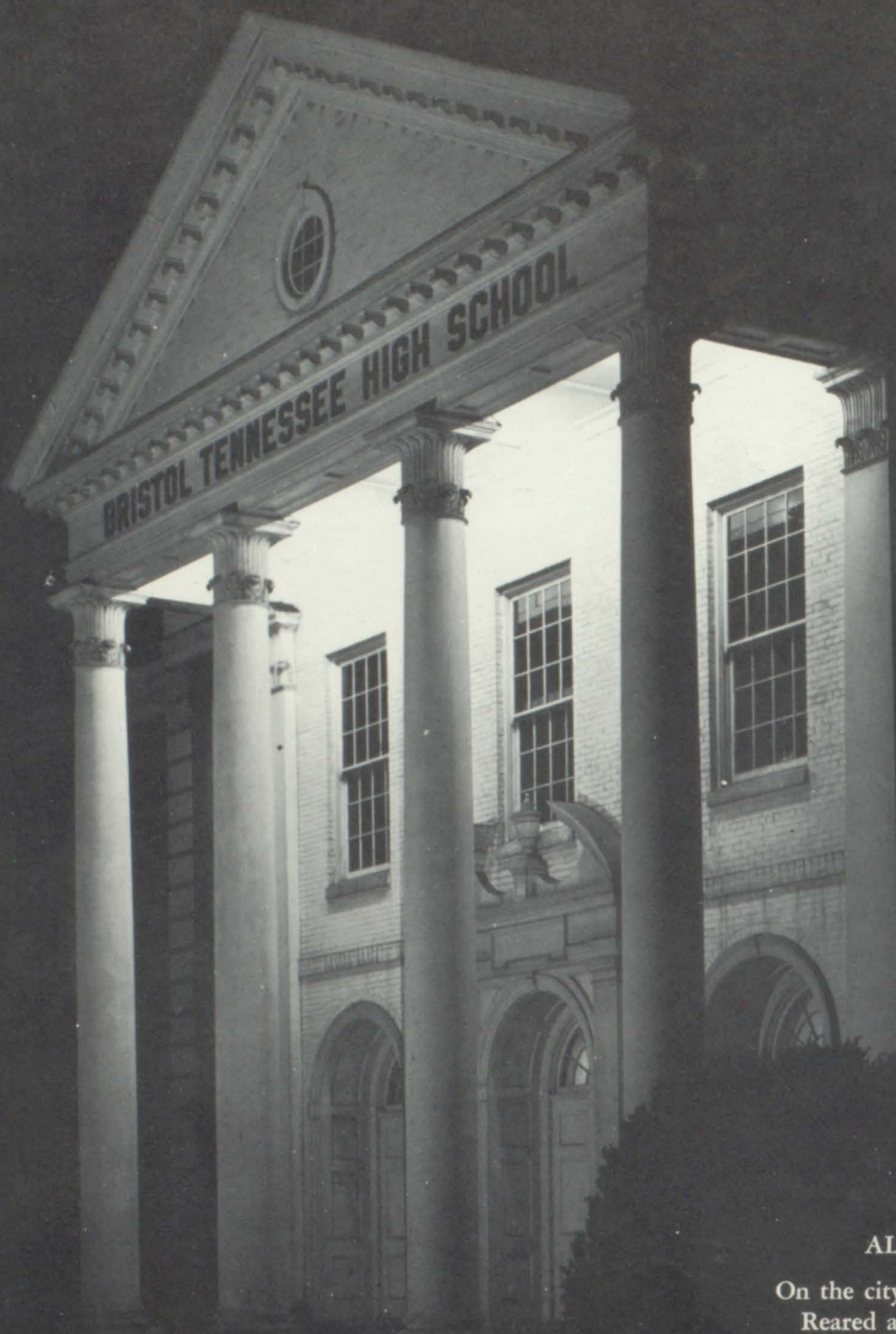

TENNESSEE HIGH SCHOOL

Tennessee High School, the only school which bears the name of the state of Tennessee, has kept pace with the rapid growth of Bristol and Tennessee in 1963. The growth of the student body from 600 to 1000 was caused mainly by the return of the freshmen from junior high. To accommodate this increase, a new wing, including a new study hall and library, a girls' gymnasium and fourteen modern classrooms, was annexed to the school. The old study hall and the library were converted into five classrooms. A complete renovation of the kitchen provided up-to-date facilities for the cooks who were able to provide fast, efficient food service to T.H.S. students. A thirty-six place parking area located behind the building helped to alleviate parking problems.

There was a 40% increase in the faculty. The fac-

ulty roll was enlarged from 29 to 40 members.

In addition to the new wing and the increase in students and faculty, many innovations appeared in the school's curricula. Modern mathematics, a new concept involving sets, and unified geometry, a combination of solid and plane geometry, was introduced to the students. For the first time, four years of Spanish were offered; and all students benefited from oral practice in the language laboratory which was completed in 1962. Science students also enjoyed new, well-equipped laboratories. American History classes instituted a study of communism into their program.

Thus Tennessee High has progressed in the 1962-63 school year along with an ever-expanding, ever-changing world.

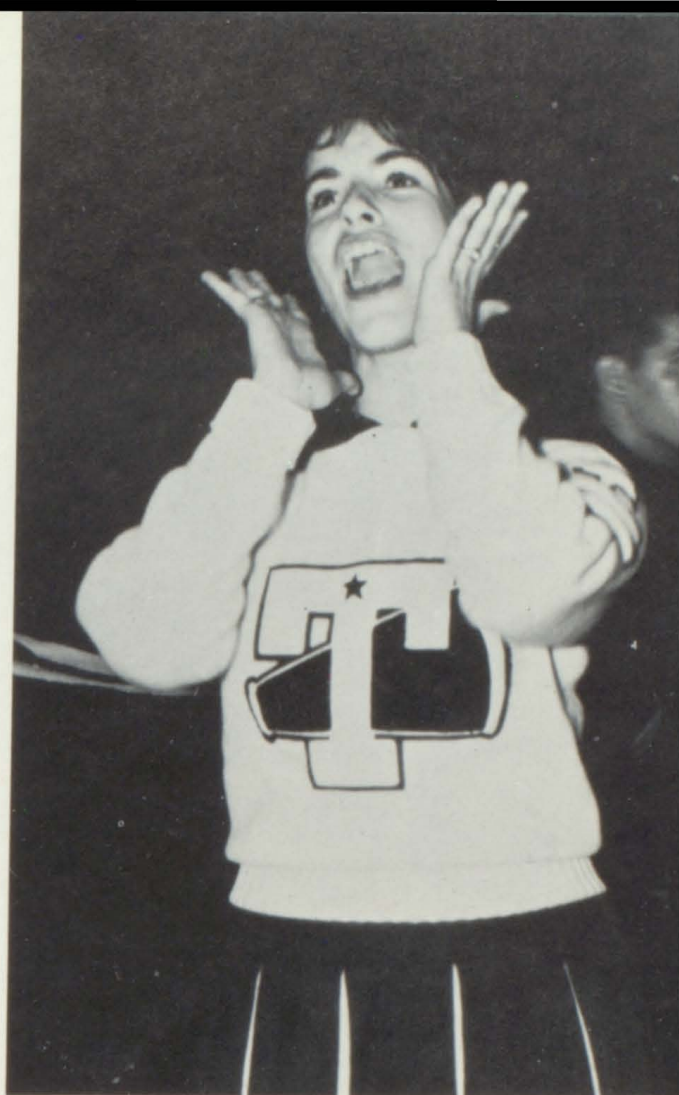

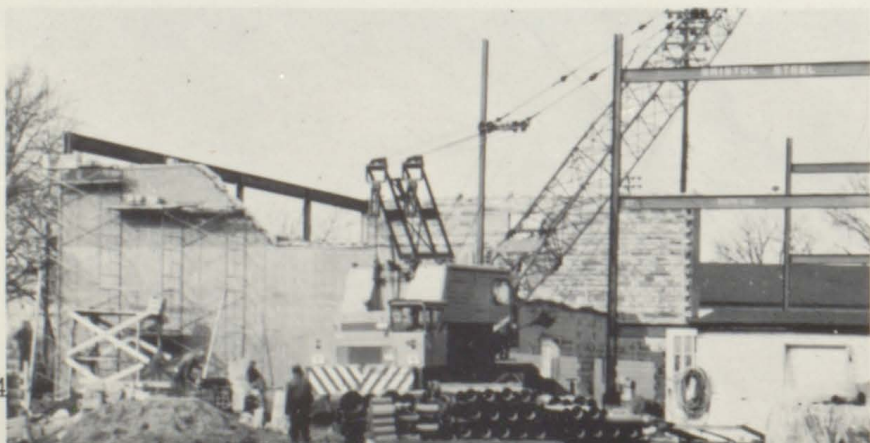

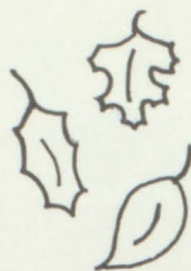

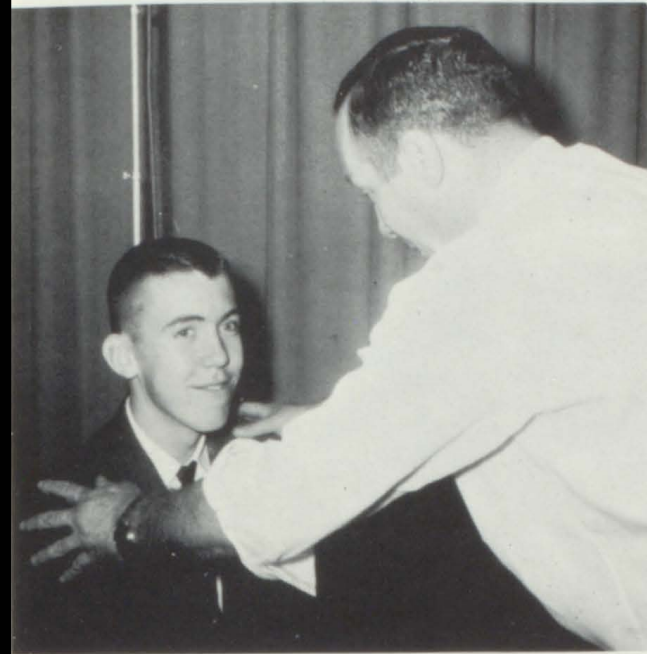

His friends began to fear him for his supposed ability and resented him because he was always too

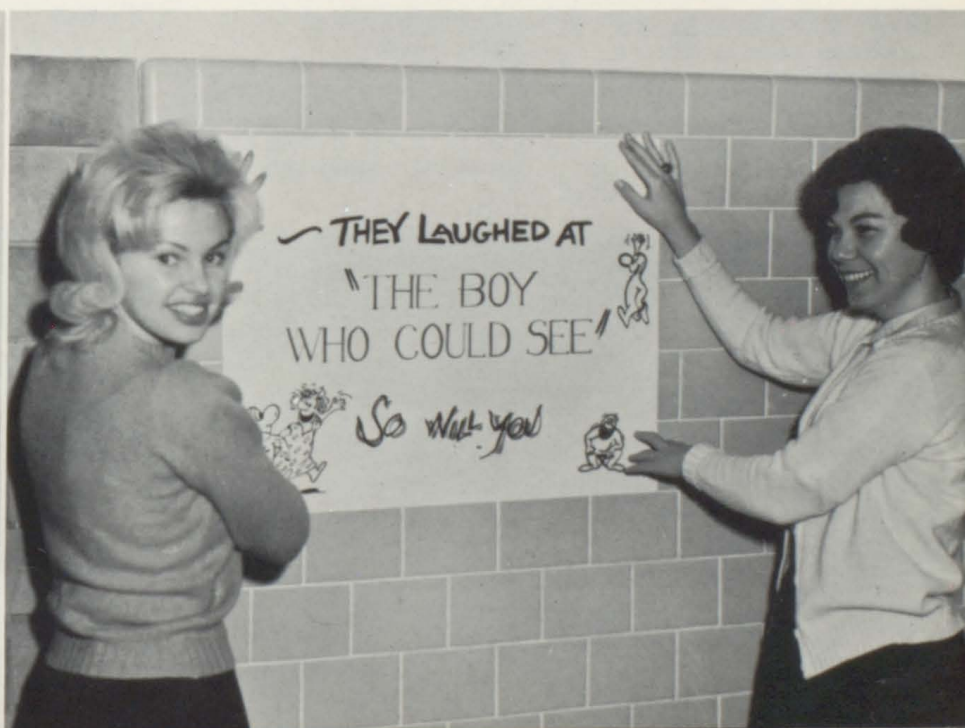
busy to see them.

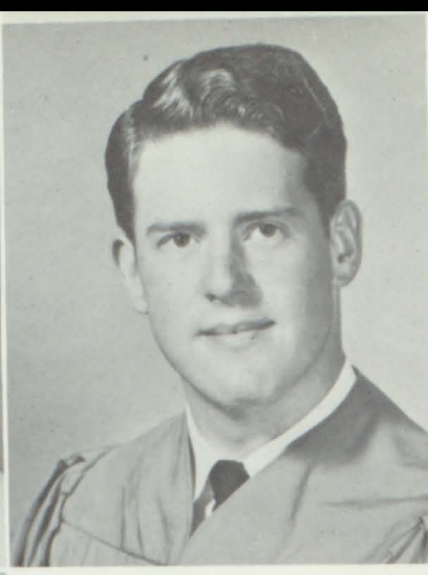

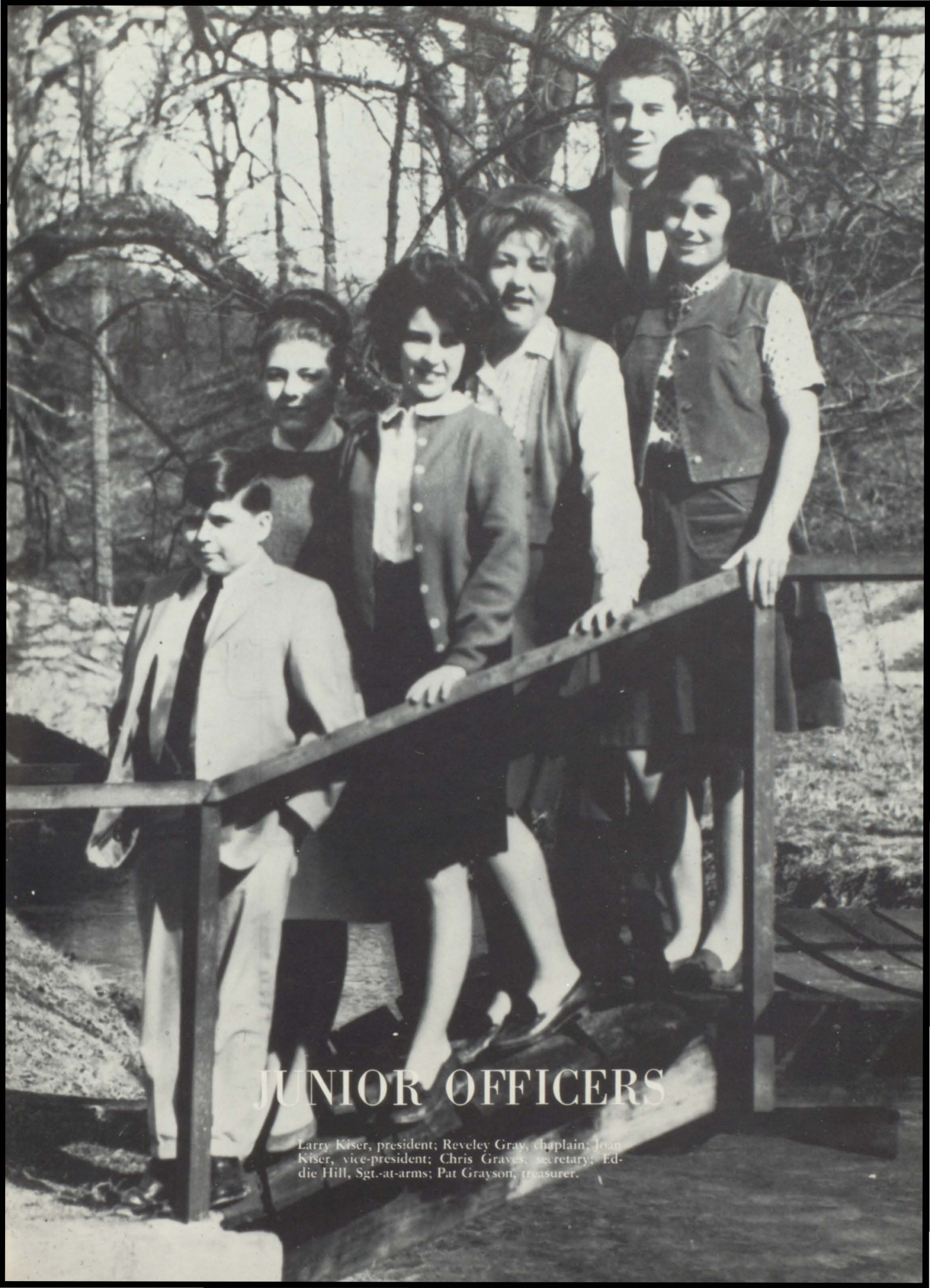

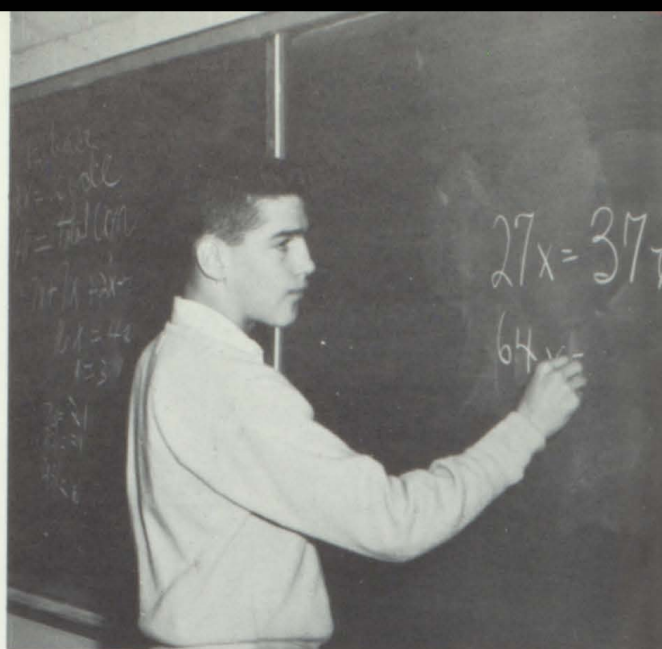

We were filled with mixed emotions as we lost our favorite upperclassmen, the seniors; but, at the same time, we looked forward to becoming upperclassmen ourselves.



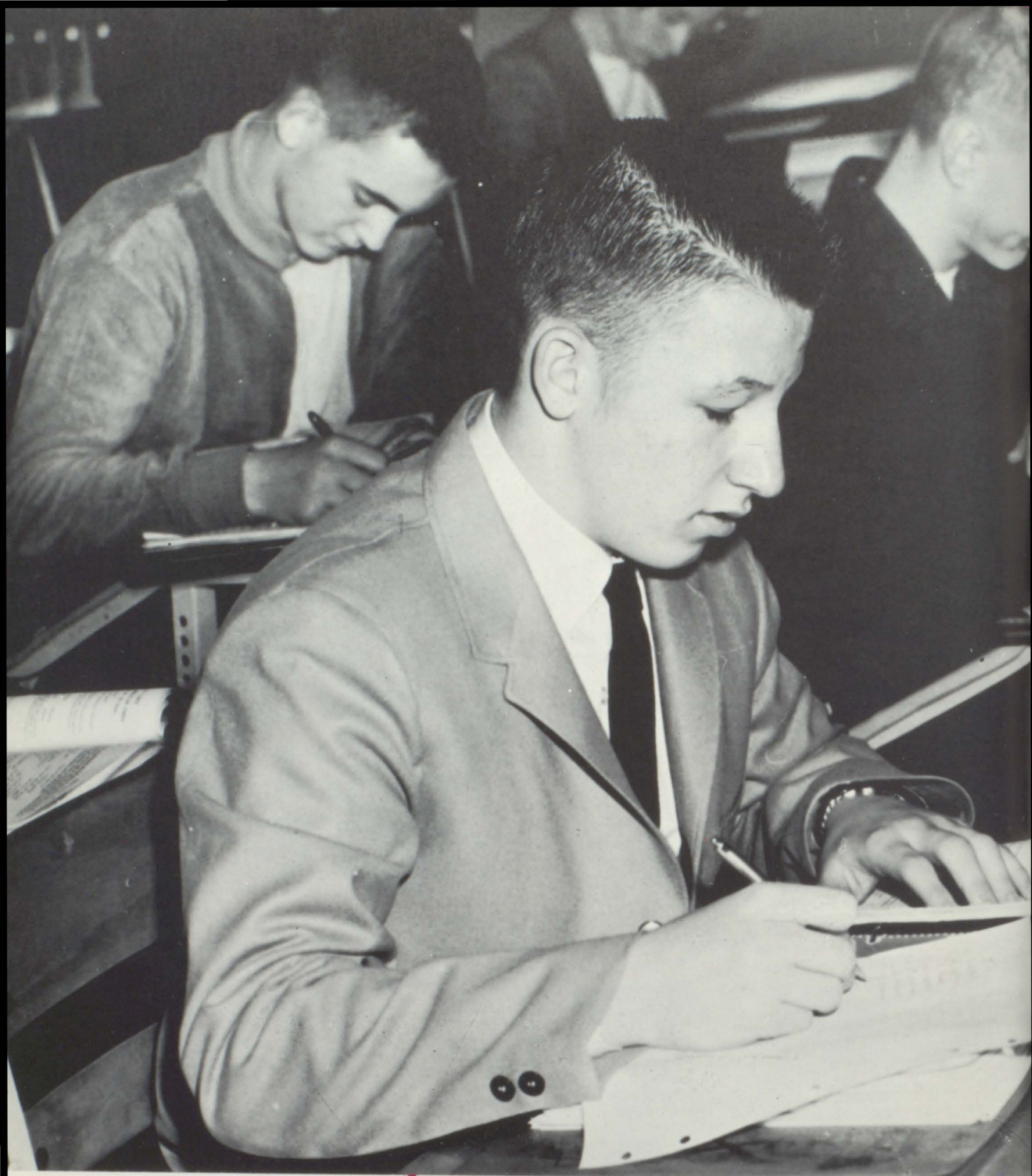

No, the students who made these statements were not speaking in Greek. They were participators in T.H.S.'s science program.

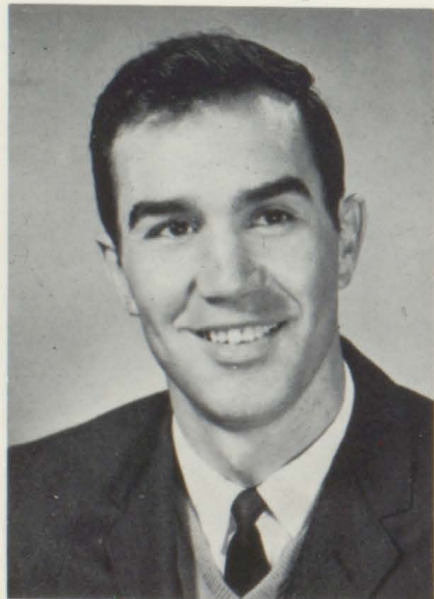
From a basic foundation in many fields, freshmen who had taken General Science proceeded into sophomore health and biology.

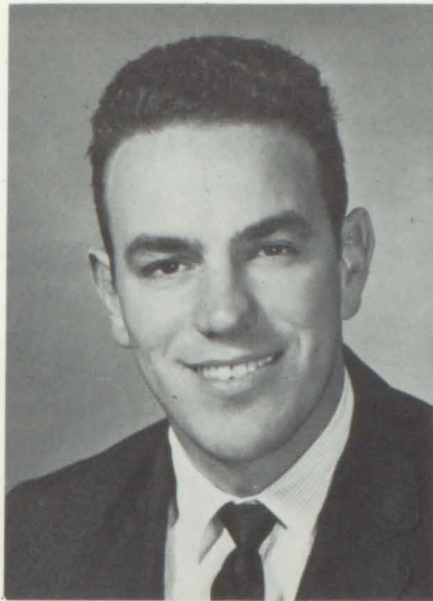

MATH MAKES MASTER MINDS

The "everpresent x and y " still dominated the *Algebraic* scene in Algebra I and II and Senior Algebra classes this year; however, the introduction of modern mathematics added further confusion by beginning a completely new concept with sets, braces, elements, functions, and variables.

Unified geometry, which is a combination of plane and solid geometry, was also added to the curriculum of Tennessee High. The terms perpendicular, parallel, adjacent, and hypotenuse cluttered the minds of all geometry students while compasses, pencils, protractors, and rulers cluttered their notebooks.

Solid Geometry, which was taken for only one semester, concentrated on three dimensional figures. Many theorms were proved with models constructed by the students, and to climax their study of polyhedrons, the students decorated a Christmas tree with the solid figures.

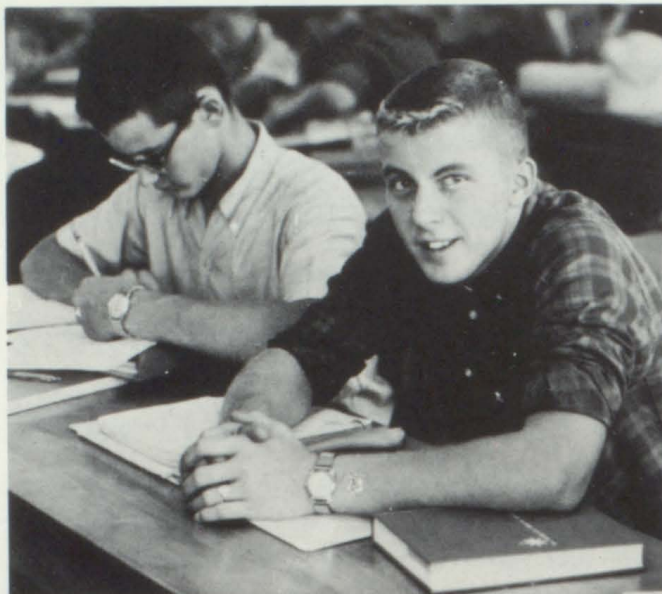
NEW STUDY HALL SEATS 250 STUDENTS

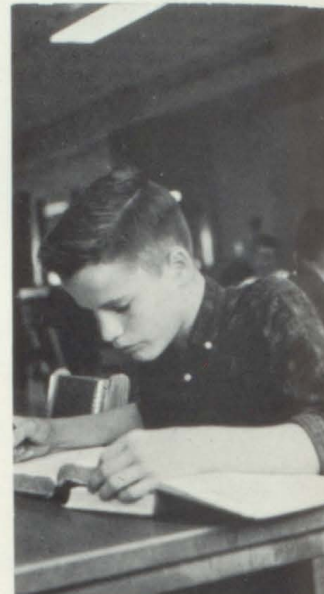
The spacious study hall, which can seat 250 pupils, was one of the new facilities annexed to the school in 1962, and had an average daily attendance of 1250.

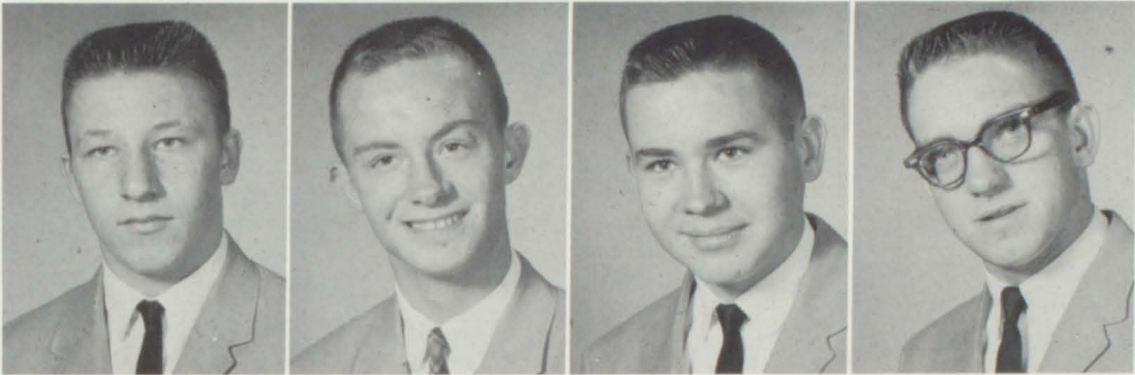
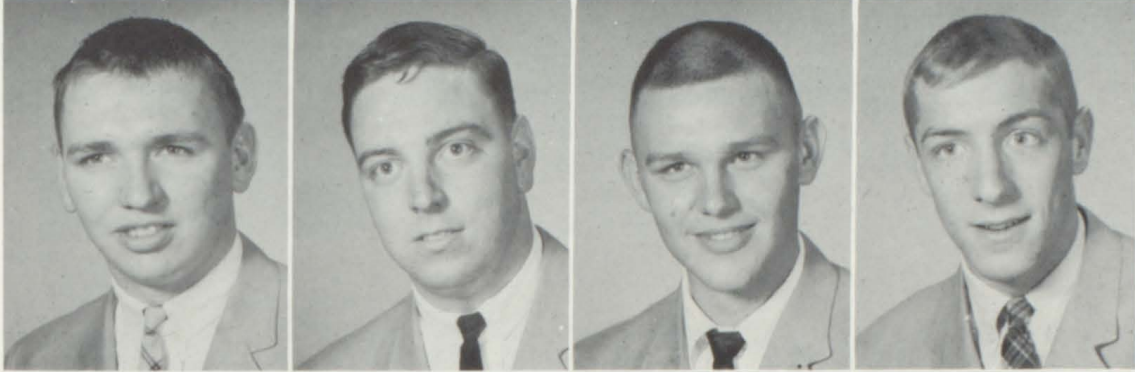
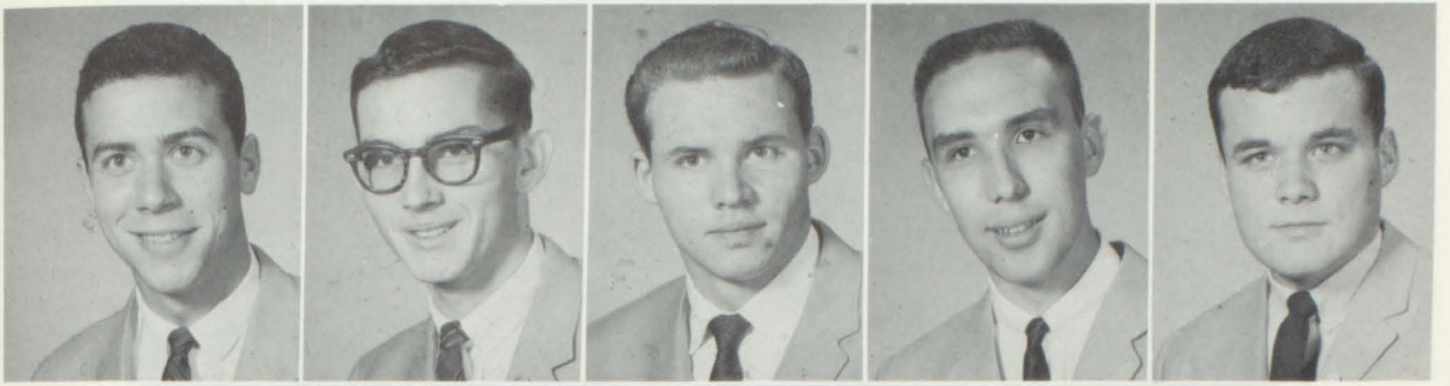
THE WHEEL CLUB PROMOTES VIKING SPIRIT

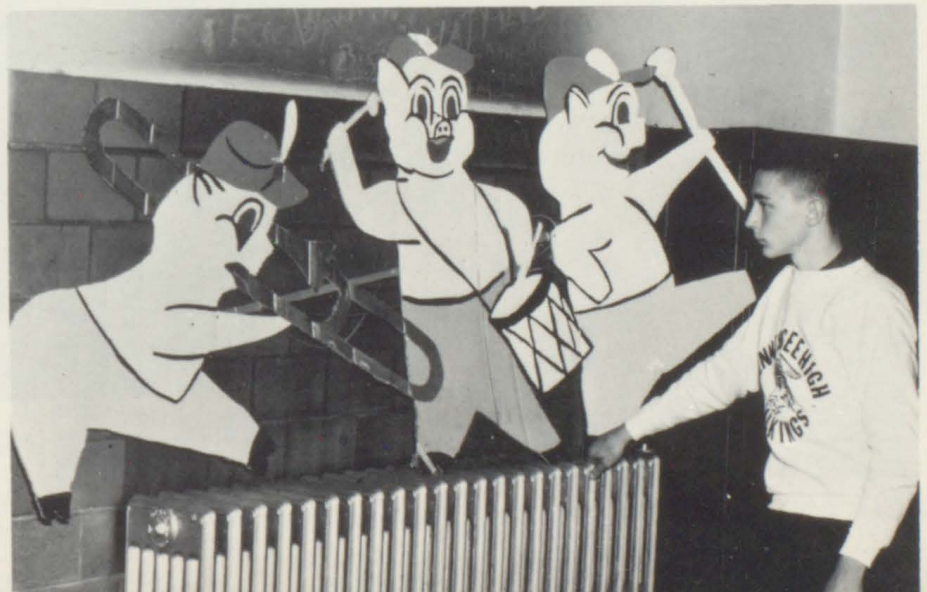

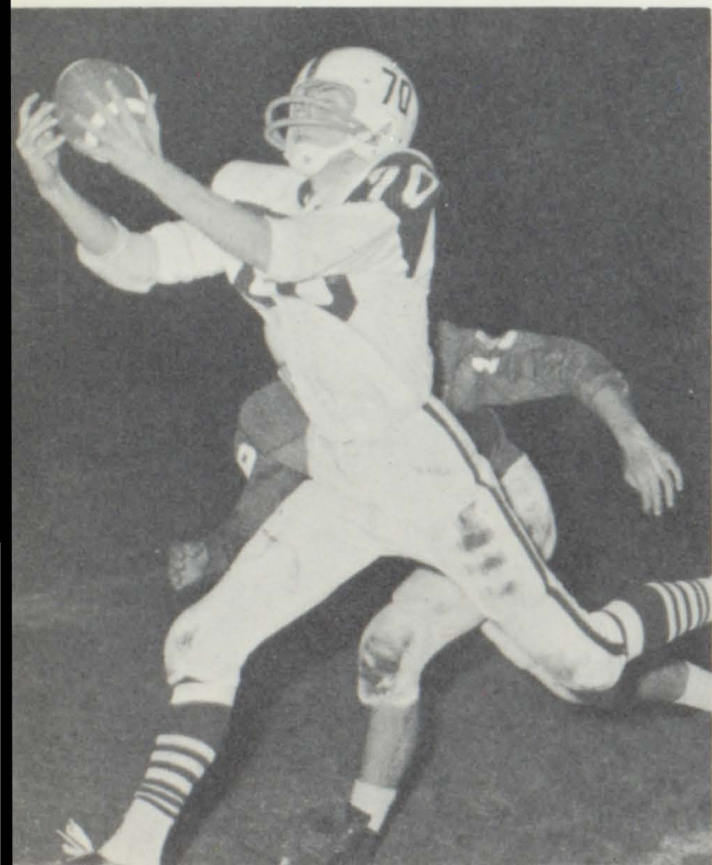

MIGHTY VIKINGS POST 8-2-1 RECORD

The 1962-63 football season of the rugged Vikings once again brought highly pleasing results as the Norsemen turned in an admirable 8-2-1 worksheet. Under the capable direction of Head Coach Clayton Powers, Line Coach Fred Keller, and Backfield Coach Tom Hundley, the Viking gridders scored 236 points while allowing only 79.

In the opening tilt an outclassed Unaka team was swamped. The following week, however, the Vikings were upset by Greeneville. Aroused by this loss, the boys promptly rallied to trounce Albermarle County, Virginia. Defensive stalwart Ronnie Long blocked an extra point attempt in the final minutes of play to provide the winning margin in a 20-19 victory over the Hilltoppers of Johnson City. Tasting of victory and finding it to their liking, the Vikings next took the measure of highly touted Baylor Prep of Chattanooga. Elizabethton fell before the Norsemen, and Erwin was then soundly beaten. In one of the greatest defensive games ever played in East Tennessee, highly favored Morristown was held to a dramatic scoreless tie. Traditional rival Kingsport, however, once more thwarted hopes for an upset, leaving the Vikings on the short end of a narrow 13-14 margin. Speedily recovering, the boys overpowered Meigs County. In the year's final contest, arch-foe Virginia High proved no match for the hard-nosed Vikings as we defeated them, 25-0, a victory which always makes the season a success.

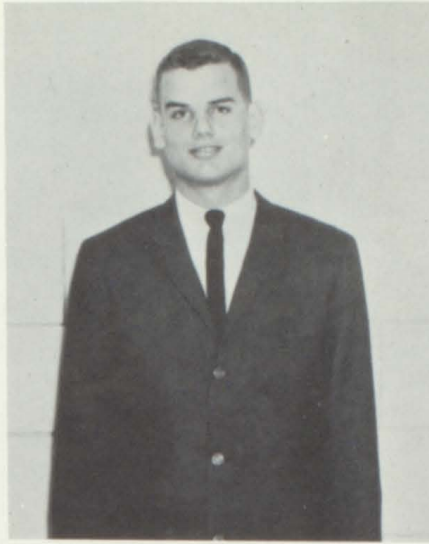

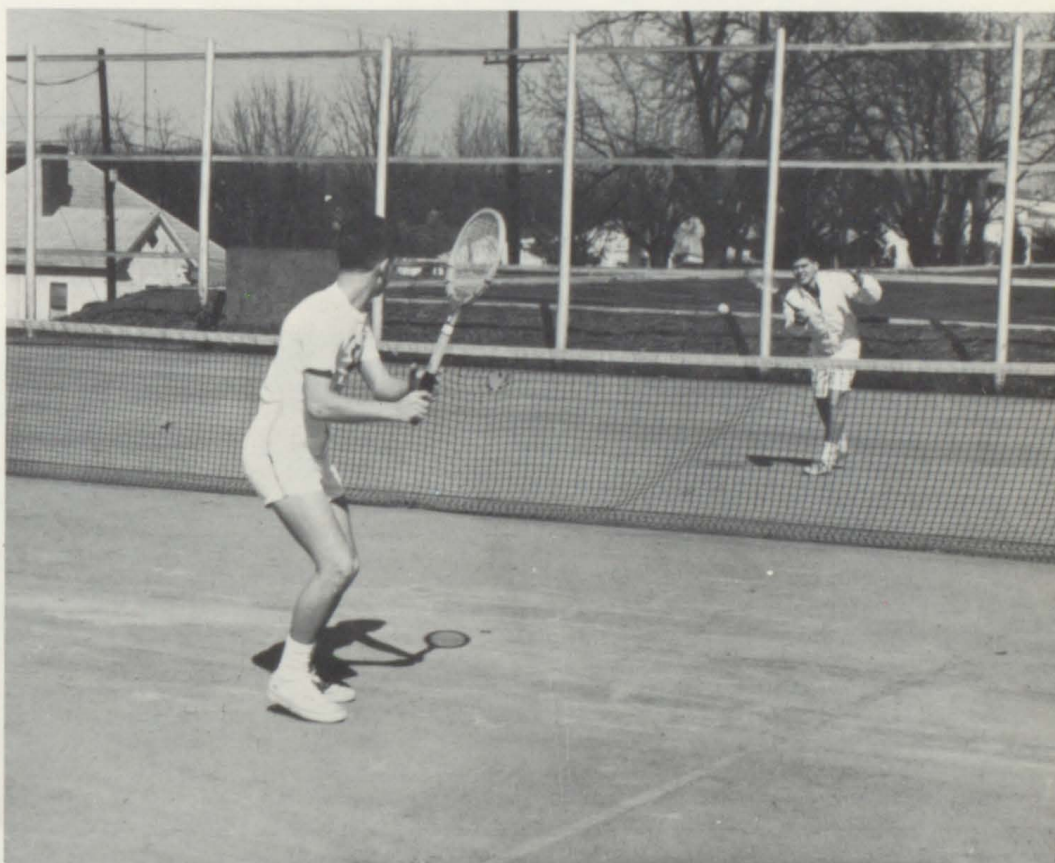
